# 1. Minutes

### Readfield Select Board Regular Meeting Minutes May 4, 2015

Select Board members present: Valarie Pomerleau, Sue Reay, Greg Durgin, Allen Curtis, Thomas Dunham Others attending: Shannon Gould, William Starrett, Kristie Hutchinson (PEG TV), Teresa Shaw (Interim Town Manager), Robin Lint (Town Clerk), Christine Sammons, John Parent, Milton Wright, Grace Keene, Sandra Rourke, Pamela Osborn, Gene Carbona, Francis Zambella, Lorraine Wagner and Debora Doten.

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm by Sue Reay, Chair. The Pledge of Allegiance was made. (1) Minutes:

- **Motion** by Mr. Durgin to accept the minutes of 4/16/15 as written, **second** by Mr. Dunham; **vote** 5-0 in favor.
- Motion by Mr. Curtis to accept the minutes of 4/21/15 as written, second by Mr. Dunham; vote 4-0-1 in favor with Mr. Durgin abstaining because he was not present at the 4/21/15 meeting.
   Mr. Dunham said that the last line in section 5A was wrong and that he asked what the speed limit was on the Church Rd.
  - Motion by Mrs. Pomerleau to reopen the last vote, second by Mr. Dunham; vote 5-0 in favor. Motion by Mr. Curtis to accept the minutes of 4/21/15 as amended, second by Mrs. Pomerleau; vote 4-0-1 in favor with Mr. Durgin abstaining because he was not present at the 4/21/15 meeting.
- Motion by Mr. Curtis to accept the minutes of 4/27/15 as written, second by Mr. Dunham; vote 5-0 in favor.

(2) Warrant: The warrant was reviewed by Mr. Durgin. Motion by Mr. Durgin to accept warrant #22 in the amount of \$330,550.22, second Mr. Curtis; vote 5-0 in favor.

- The Board discussed the damage to a cemetery fence on the Plains Road and whether the snow plow contractor should be held responsible for the damage before his last check is released.
- It was the consensus of the Board that the contractor should not be held responsible because the fence is in the town's right of way and the amount of snow this year was extraordinary.
- The Interim Fown Manager will let the contractor know of the damage to the fence so he will be aware of it next year.

## (3) Select Board communications and goals update:

- 7. Select Board E-mails: Mrs. Reay reported that she has received a legal ruling on the board members wanting to have their Select Board e-mail accounts shut off. Legal services said there is no State law requiring towns to assign town email addresses or requiring board members to use town-provided email addresses. Legal also recommends that the board take a vote to that effect and then instruct the town manager to arrange to eliminate town email addresses for the board members who decline them.
- Mr. Durgin said that he was not at the last Select Board meeting in which the minutes of the April 7,
   2015 meeting minutes were changed and approved. Mr. Durgin said if he was there he would not have voted to change the minutes.
- Mr. Curtis explained that while the board was in negotiations with the Union that the Select Board and the employees could not talk about contract negotiations. Mr. Curtis said that the board needed to appoint a Chief Negotiator to sign any tentative contracts. It was the consensus of the board that they needed more information on that before they would appoint someone.
- Mr. Dunham asked for the board's direction to finish up the informational description sheet that Ms. Pomerleau and he had been working on. The board said it looked good and that the last sentence should

- read: Presently the Town of Readfield has a mil rate of 18.5%. It should also say "This information is being provided by the Readfield Select Board.
- Mr. Durgin asked that the Appointment Policy Adhoc committee directives be put on the next meeting agenda for a second reading.
- RFP's for roadwork: Mr. Dunham asked if the Road committee could work on the RFPs for the summer roadwork. Mr. Parent said the Road Committee has never done the RFPs in the past and didn't feel that it was the responsibility of the volunteers of the Road Committee to do the RFP's. It has always been the Road Commissioner/Town Manager who did the RFP's to make sure that all the legal wording was added to protect the town.

**Motion** by Mr. Dunham to reopen his motion of April 21<sup>st</sup> concerning the directives to the Road Committee, seconded by Mr. Curtis. Vote 4-0-1 in favor with Mr. Durgin abstaining because he was not present at the 4/21/15 meeting.

**Motion** by Mr. Dunham to amend his motion to include the Road Committee in collaboration with the Road Commissioner to work on the three directives and have the RFP's ready for the first week of June's Select Board meeting, second by Mr. Curtis. Vote 5-0 in favor.

• Mrs. Reay reported that they do not have a moderator for Candidate's night. If one is not found the Interim Town Manager offered to do it. There are moderators set up for the two public hearings on May 27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup>.

### (11) Emporium Liquor License Public Hearing:

- Motion by Mr. Dunham to take agenda item #11 out of order, second by Ms. Pomerleau. Vote 5-0 in favor. Mrs. Reay opened the Public Hearing on the Emporium's Liquor License renewal at 7:30 pm. Seeing no questions from the public or the board, Mrs. Reay closed the public hearing at 7:39 pm.
- **Motion** by Mrs. Reay to approve the liquor license for the Emporium from 6-10-2015 thru 6-9-2016, second by Mr. Durgin. Vote 5-0 in favor.

### (6) Municipal Resources Inc:

- Mr. Durgin gave his observation of the process. Mr. Durgin said that Mr. Jutton never asked him a question but Mr. Durgin did get to ask Mr. Jutton two questions. Mr. Durgin went on to say that Mr. Jutton seemed to be pushing his business and resume.
- Mr. Curtis said he wasn't 100% satisfied. Mr. Curtis said he had higher expectations but realized that Mr. Jutton only had 8 hours or so here in town. Mr. Curtis would have liked to see a road map of what direction the town should be going in.
- Mrs. Reay also expressed her disappointment in the process and results. Mrs. Reay will send Mr. Jutton a letter in response to the report and express the board's disappointment.
- Mr. Parent expressed his disappointment with the board in going around their own Purchasing Policy. The original proposal from MRI was for \$1,000 which would have required the board to go out to bid. Mrs. Reay explained that the companies that do this kind of work are very rare so it would have been hard to find other business to bid on it. MRI was willing to do it for \$999.99 which kept it under the bid requirement amount.

### (8) Town Manager's Job Description:

• Added: Required to live within 30 minutes of driving time under normal weather conditions. Several other amendments were added and deleted. No vote was taken but there was a consensus of the board.

### (9) Town Manager's Job Ad:

• The Board amended the ad by adding some of the same language as in the job description. No e-mails or fax applications will be accepted. No vote was taken but there was a consensus of the board.

### (10) Church Road Signs:

- Discussion on what signs would say to slow traffic in the Fairgrounds property area in the Church Road. Baseball games are now being held on the new ballfield but parking is lacking and it was reported that cars are parking on both sides of the road.
- Motion by Mr. Curtis to purchase and install two signs on the Church Road in the area of the trails and recreation area and should read "Recreation Area Use Caution", second by Mr. Durgin. Vote 4-1 in favor with Mr. Dunham voting in the negative.
- Mr. Durgin will talk with Mrs. Dupont of the Recreation Committee about no parking signs for the road side.

### (18) Public Communication:

• Mr. Parent announced that the Readfield Citizens Unite Group is doing a roadside clean-up on May 9, 2015. Mrs. Reay said that the trash from the State owned roads could not be brought to the Transfer Station. Mrs. Reay said that the previous town manager had said that last year when some high school kids cleaned-up the sides of Route 17. The State DOT came out and picked it up. Mr. Parent said that DOT only plans on cleaning up Route 202 and asked the board to think about it and maybe bring it back up at tomorrow night's meeting.

### (14) Legal RFP's:

- 6 Legal firms sent in proposals. O'Donnell, Lee, Mccown & Phillips, LLC; PretiFlaherty; Shelton Taintor & Abbott, Linnell, Choate & Webber; Eaton Peabody & Bernstein Shur. The Interim Town Manager included a spreadsheet with the breakdown for each firm and their charges.
- Motion by Mr. Durgin to extend the meeting to 9:30pm, second by Mr. Curtis. Vote 4-1 in favor with Ms. Pomerleau voting in the negative.
- Mr. Dunham said he would recuse himself from voting or discussing this item if the board agreed he should. Mr. Dunham said he had a personal relationship with PretiFlaherty and has hired them and used them during the charter debate.
- Motion by Mr. Curtis to request the useage of the firm Linnell, Choate & Webber to be the town lawyers and request they be our lawyer with no contract, second by Mr. Durgin. Vote 0-5 motion fails.
- Motion by Mr. Curtis to invite a representative from Linnell, Choate & Webber and PretiFlaherty to attend a Select Board meeting for the purpose of communicating their firm's ability to perform legal services for the Town of Readfield, second by Mrs. Reay. Vote 5-0 in favor.
- Motion by Mr. Curtis to extend the meeting to 9:45 pm, second by Mr. Dunham. Vote 3-2 in favor with Mr. Durgin and Ms. Pomerleau voting in the negative.
- It was the consensus of the board that the Interim Town Manager contact both firms to see if they could meet with the board on May 12<sup>th</sup>, one firm at 4:30 pm and the other at 5:30 pm.

### (15) Library Painting RFP's:

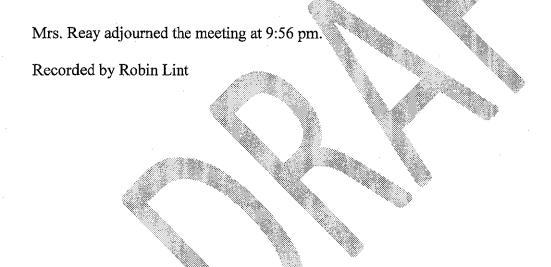

### (13) Job Application:

- It was the consensus of the board to make a couple of small changes and okay the application to be used as the town's official job application.
- Motion by Mrs. Reay to extend the meeting for 7 more minutes, second by Mr. Dunham. Vote 3-2 in favor with Mr. Durgin and Ms. Pomerleau voting in the negative.

### (17) Other: Readfield Citizens Unite:

- Mrs. Reay said she would like to see the disclaimer on the web site state that the **statements** and views expressed by the Readfield Citizens Unite and Voice of the Voter groups are not the views of the Select Board or the Town of Readfield.
- Motion by Mr. Curtis to add to the web site disclaimer "that the views expressed by Readfield Citizens Unite and Voice of the Voter do not reflect the views of the Select Board or the Town of Readfield, second by Ms. Pomerleau. Vote 4-1 in favor with Mr. Dunham voting in the negative.



# Readfield Select Board Special Meeting Minutes May 12, 2015 – unapproved

**Select Board members present:** Sue Reay, Valarie Pomerleau, P. Greg Durgin, Thomas Dunham and Allen Curtis.

Mrs. Reay called the meeting to order at 4:32 pm.

### 1. Legal RFP – Discussion with two law firms

The first law firm was PretiFlaherty represented by Steve Langsdorf and Kevin Haskin.

- Mr. Dunham opened the conversation by disclosing his relationship with Mr. Langsdorf.
- Mr. Durgin said that he had copies of e-mails between Mr. Langsdorf and Mr. Dunham and asked Mr. Langsdorf if he had initiated the conversation between himself and Mr. Dunham. Mr. Langsdorf said he had and that he had been watching the papers and wondered if the Town would be going back out to bid this year for legal services. Mr. Durgin also asked Mr. Langsdorf if the two had met together which the e-mails had stated might happen. Mr. Langsdorf said they did not.
- Gave a background report on himself and his firm.
- Stated that he did almost 100% labor laws, which is his specialty.
- He would answer e-mails as promptly as possible.
- Would do conference call meetings.
- They would also do and currently does detail billing.

The second law firm was Linnell, Choate & Webber represented by John (Jack) Conway and Curtis Webber.

- Gave a background report on themselves and their firm.
- Their firm has experience with labor law
- Economic development
- FOAA's
- Executive session matters
- Planning Board procedures
- Solid Waste
- Works with towns so not to run up legal cost by having phone meetings.
- Tries to return e-mails the same day or the next day.
- Does detail billing

Mrs. Reay clarified that the Chair and Vice Chair are the only Select Board members that may contact legal services and with permission from the board only.

#### 2. Other

Mr. Donagan, from the Recreation Board, was in attendance to discuss the issue of parking on the Church Road during ball games. Mr. Donagan said they could flatten some more of the field to make room for more cars to park. Currently there are only about 35 spaces to park. Mr. Donagan will meet with the Conservation Commission to discuss the matter with them and to get their permission to make more parking spaces. The Conservation Commission was meeting down stairs at the time and Mr. Donagan went to check with them. He reported back later in the meeting saying that the Conservation Commission gave him permission to level the field in order to make more parking space.

Mr. Curtis expressed his concern about the delay in being process of hiring a new town manager.

May 18<sup>th</sup> the board will decide the following:

- Where to advertise
- How long to advertise
- Full or part-time

On June 1<sup>st</sup> the Board will decide who will be involved.

On June 8<sup>th</sup> the Board will look at applications at an executive session workshop at 4:30 pm.

Mr. Dunham expressed his concern about the April 25<sup>th</sup> Community Advertiser article. Mr. Dunham said the information was not totally factual and if the board does nothing to respond to the lies then he felt they were condoning the article and the information in it.

- Ms. Pomerleau disagrees and said doing nothing doesn't mean they condone the information.
- Mr. Curtis said he felt the board was being pulled in two different directions and that the board should not get in the middle of it.
- Mr. Durgin expressed his desire for both groups to get together and talk.
- Mrs. Reay said that everyone needs to agree to disagree.
- Mr. Dunham insisted the board take some action.

The consensus of the board was to do nothing about the articles.

The Interim Town Manager sent all the Select Board members an e-mail concerning a resident's request to respond to the disagreement between residents after Candidate's Night. There was a lengthy discussion about what happened and what was said to whom and how people responded to each other. It was the consensus of the board after hearing from everyone involved that there was no need for the board to respond further.

Mr. Parent reported that Saturday, May 9<sup>th</sup>, 18 residents met at the Fairgrounds and worked together to clean up town roads. The group picked up 30 bags of trash, 10 bags of returnables, 6-7 tires, 1 TV, a hood of a car and some grills. A big thank you goes out to Kevin Norwood who paid for the tires at the Transfer Station.

### Title 23 Chapter 21

### §1917-A. Unlawful removal of political signs

1. Taking, defacing or disturbing political sign; civil violation. A person who takes, defaces or disturbs a lawfully placed sign bearing political messages relating to a general election, primary election or referendum commits a civil violation for which a forfeiture of up to \$250 may be adjudged.

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[ 1989, c. 315, (NEW) .]
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- **2. Application.** This section does not apply to:
- A. A person authorized by a candidate or political committee to remove signs placed by or at the direction of that candidate or political committee; and [1989, c. 315, (NEW).]
- B. The landowner, or agent of the landowner, on whose property a sign has been placed. [1989, c. 315, (NEW).]

# 11. Town Manager Job Description

# Town Manager Job Description

The Town of Readfield adopted the Town Manager form of Government at the March 18, 1967 in Article 22 and Article 23a was also adopted, stating that the Town Manager would also serve as Treasurer, Tax Collector, Road Commissioner and Overseer of the Poor (now most commonly referred to as Welfare Administrator). The Town Manager position may be full or part time. Requirement to live within 30 minutes of the Town Office under normal driving conditions.

### **Nature of Work**

The Town Manager of Readfield is the Chief Administrative Officer of the town, under the direction of the Select Board. The Town Manager is responsible for directing all the town's business and supervises all of the town's employees with the exception of the Fire Chief. The Town Manager will also serve as the Treasurer, Tax Collector, Road Commissioner, and Welfare Administrator and Transfer Station Manager. Work performance must be in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, local ordinances and town policies.

This is responsible and varied professional work as the chief administrative officer in managing the affairs of the Town of Readfield under the direction of the Select Board in keeping with State and Federal laws, Town ordinances, and Town policies including the Roles and Responsibilities of the Readfield Town Manager.

The Manager is charged with the identification of service and policy needs of Readfield and has the responsibility for the development of the program or action directed by the Select Board to meet the identified needs of the community. The Manager shall act in such capacity as the Select Board may direct on municipal, state, federal and other policy issues affecting the Town.

The Manager is responsible for the annual preparation of the proposed budget and administration of the budget once it is approved. The Manager is also responsible for developing administrative procedures and for ensuring adherence to these procedures by all departments and employees,

The Manager is charged with the responsibility of advising the Select Board and general public on the current status of affairs of the Town

and is responsible for preparing an annual report of the previous year's activities.

The Manager is responsible for the maintenance of sound, positive public relations between the Town and its citizens; between Readfield and other governmental agencies and between the various boards, committees and commissions that make up Readfield Town Government.

### Scope of Work

This is responsible managerial, administrative and fiscal work in directing all aspects of the operation of the Town as well as the handling and accounting of Town Funds.

The Town Manager is responsible for the achievement of tangible results through people, so maintaining a high level of integrity is essential. Work involves planning, budgeting, problem solving and organizing with the authority to make decisions as well as delegate to others. The environment is relatively unpredictable and requires the ability to manage many projects at once. Although governed by policies, the Manager must frequently act without precedent.

### **Essential Duties and Responsibilities**

- Maintains the administrative organization of the Town to ensure efficiency of operation;
- Oversees the expenditure and accounting of all monies of the Town;
- o Executes all laws and ordinances of the Town;
- Paeticipates in collective bargaining with town employees upon request of the select board, prepares a proposed budget and work program for all Town employees and presents the proposed budget to the Select Board;
- Appoints, with Select Board approval, all department heads and supervises their performance on a day-to-day basis;
- As personnel officer for the Town, is directly involved in the hiring, evaluating performance of duties per individual job descriptions, promoting, and disciplining of union and non-union employees;
- Plans, directs and reviews all repair, maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Town roads and bridges, contracting for services when necessary;
- Acts as Welfare Administrator, in accordance with State Laws, assuring the security and confidentiality of all records and requests for Town assistance;
- Develops the annual tax commitment figures along with the Assessor's and presents them to the Select Board for approval;

- Reviews on an ongoing basis, the collection of municipal taxes and takes appropriate steps to assure an adequate revenue stream (cash flow) for the Town;
- Oversees and directs the overall operation of the Transfer Station to assure compliance with all environmental laws and regulations, efficiency of operation, and promoting maximum recycling, and contracting for services where required;
- Maintains a sound public relations posture between the Town and its citizens, the press and other state, federal and local government agencies;
- Acts as purchasing agent for all municipal departments, and oversees the bid process on major purchases;
- Identifies the service and policy needs of Readfield and brings them to the attention of the Select Board with recommendations for action;
- Ensures Town-owned buildings stay in good repair, and equipment maintained and recommends replacement as needed;
- Works closely with the snow removal contractor to assure the safety of winter roads;
- Prepares an annual report of the previous year for presentation to the Select Board and citizens of Readfield;
- Attends meetings of the Select Board, assists in preparing the agendas, and provides supporting documents and information pertinent to agenda items;
- Carries out the directives of the Select Board within timeframe assigned;
- Prepares federal and state grant requests and administers grant programs;
- Enforces municipal and state codes in conjunction with Code Enforcement Officer;
- o Recommends possible changes to personnel policy to Select Board for consideration.

## Requirements of Work

- Thorough knowledge of municipal management and community problem resolution;
- Thorough understanding of a design and evaluation of administrative organization;
- Detailed, specialized and extensive knowledge of the practices and procedures of cash management, investment, budgeting and municipal accounting;

- o Thorough knowledge of financial administration and the design of financial accounting and reporting system;
- Thorough knowledge of the theory and practice of public personnel administration
- Thorough knowledge of municipal government programs and decision-making processes;
- o Knowledge of municipal waste management and recycling;
- Knowledge of municipal taxation including tax lien requirements;
- o Knowledge of Maine municipal laws and rules;
- o Knowledge of road construction and maintenance;
- o Working knowledge of state and federal programs;
- Ability to communicate effective both orally and in writing;
- Ability to listen effectively to others;
- o Ability to direct, supervise and to delegate work effectively;
- o Ability to organize and use time effectively;
- Ability to give and accept constructive criticism;
- Ability to remain poised and even tempered;
- Ability to effectively run meetings;
- Ability to react independently without precedent in the face of a problem;
- Ability to react quickly to changing situations which may be physically taxing;
- o Skill in resolving disputes while maintaining integrity.

## **General Disciplinary Procedures and Principles**

The Town Manager is responsible to perform the Requirements of Work as indicated in the section above. Failure to complete any items set forth under the Requirements of Work, Essential Duties and Responsibilities, and or complete goals or objectives set forth by the Readfield Select Board, will enter into the "progressive discipline" process. Progressive discipline includes the following procedures:

- Informal meeting
- Verbal warning/reprimand
- Written warning/reprimand
- Suspension
- Discharge

# 14. Public Communication Policy

#### Readfield Select Board Policy for "Public Communications" Sessions

The Select Board encourages citizens of the Town of Readfield to attend Board meetings, conducted at the Town Office at 6:30 Monday evenings, which are open to both the press and the public except during executive sessions. Executive sessions, which usually occur at the end of a meeting, deal with topics that the open discussion of which may potentially harm the Town, affected individuals or both, or are authorized/mandated by state law. The Select Board follows state law with regard to executive sessions. The Board encourages residents to bring issues of concern or interest of an individual or of the community to the attention of the Select Board. Citizen involvement in Town governance enhances the sense of community that makes Readfield a great place to live, work, and visit. Select Board meetings follow an agenda, which lists the issues the Board will address. The Board wants to hear from citizens and recognizes one way for residents to participate is to speak out in the "Public\_Communications" sections of each Select Board Meeting. The Select Board also recognizes that efficient, productive and orderly meetings are essential to ensure full and fair consideration of agenda subjects at each meeting. To balance these two interests, the Select Board adopts this Policy to govern the "Public\_Communications" agenda item of the meetings.

- 1. Citizens will be allowed to comment on each agenda, with comments pertaining only to the item being discussed before final action is taken. Comments will be limited to three minutes.
- 2. There will be one "Public Communications" segment at each regularly scheduled Select Board Meeting at the end of the meeting. Each Public Communications segment is limited to fifteen minutes, allowing three (3) minutes per person. Repeat speakers shall be allowed to speak again after anyone wishing to speak has done so and we are still in the fifteen minute allotted time frame. The full fifteen minute time interval will not be reserved for potential discussion. A citizen who is present at the meeting may request the Select Board to extend the Public Communication time, with the Select Board voting on the amount of time and either accepting or rejecting the additional time allocation requested.
- 3. All public comments or questions shall be directed to the Chairperson, who will recognize each speaker in turn. Remarks may not exceed three minutes per speaker. Each speaker must identify him/herself and the group he/she represents, if applicable. Speakers may not "read into the record" remarks prepared for or directed to another person or entity. This segment of the agenda is intended for brief, usually informal, discussions.
- 4. A speaker requesting to present a more formal or comprehensive discussion may request in advance to be on the agenda for that evening. To request to be on the agenda, one should contact the Town Manager by Monday noon prior to the following scheduled Select Board Meeting. The "Public Communications" segment is not an appropriate time to request an interpretation and/or decision of the Select Board. All reasonable requests will be considered, but it will be at the Select Board Chairperson's discretion whether to allow an agenda item, depending on the nature of the request and the time available at a specific meeting. Any request to be on the agenda denied by the Chairperson of the Board, may be brought forth before the entire Select Board during Public Communications time for the entire Select Board to review. If a motion is made and passes to add the item to a future agenda, the Chairperson will add it to the agenda within the next two scheduled Select Board meetings.
- 5. The Select Board will not accept written materials distributed at a Select Board meeting, other than petitions submitted in accordance with state law. Individuals or groups must submit written materials for the Board's attention to the Chairperson of the Select Board, no later than noon on the Monday before the next scheduled Select Board meeting. The Chairperson shall provide to the Town Manager any written materials received from the public for distribution to all Board members. Please reference Number 8 below.
- 6. Individuals or groups who desire a response from the Select Board are advised to contact the Town Manager and all Select Board Members to request placing an item on the Board's agenda for discussion

or submit a letter rather than relying on a "Public Communications" session. The Select Board shall note any concerns, questions, comments and communications from the public and possibly address at a following meeting. The Chairperson also could direct the individual or group to an appropriate resource for further information. The Select Board will not enter into debate with the public on a topic but may provide factual information regarding the substance of a comment or ask clarifying questions. Following the meeting, the Chairperson, on behalf of the Select Board will submit contact information (if provided) for the member of the public who asked a question or provided a comment to the appropriate resource for further information, if needed.

- 7. Questions about Town affairs and criticisms or concerns about Town policies, actions, or programs are welcome, provided they do not become personal.
- 8. No personal attacks on any individual or firm, including Town employees, Town officials, or members of the public, will be tolerated during any meetings. Please direct concerns about Town officials to the Chairperson of the Select Board outside the public meeting. Complaints concerning any employee of the Town, other than the Town Manager, shall be directed only to the Town Manager and are not permitted to be publicly discussed, pursuant to Maine Labor Laws. Complaints involving the Town Manager shall be directed to the Select Board for consideration, but are not permitted to be publicly discussed pursuant to Maine Labor Laws.
- 9. The Select Board vests in its Chairperson the discretion to terminate any remarks if the speaker does not adhere to this policy. At any time, remaining Select Board members may call a point of order and ask the Chairperson to address any individual(s) that are not abiding by this policy. This pertains to the public, Select Board Members, and all Town employees.

## REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS MARANACOOK LAKE DAM RENOVATION PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING STUDY

### TOWNS OF READFIELD AND WINTHROP, MAINE MARANACOOK LAKE OUTLET DAM COMMITTEE

The Towns of Readfield and Winthrop, Kennebec County, Maine, are soliciting proposals for an engineering study to evaluate structural options to increase outflow at the Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam, and to prepare preliminary designs for selected design alternatives. The study will be overseen by the Towns' Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam Committee. Proposals are due June 11th, details below.

#### **Background**

Maranacook Lake is a 1700 acre lake located in the Towns of Readfield and Winthrop, Kennebec County, Maine. The Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam is jointly owned by both Towns and is located adjacent to 97 Bowdoin Street, Winthrop, Maine. The Dam is a concrete structure consisting of two spillways and one gate (see Maranacook Lake Dam Hydrologic Study Report, attached, for photos and survey details). The Towns have authorized the Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam Committee as their representatives charged with making recommendations to the Towns regarding maintenance needs, including structural modifications to the dam. The Cobbossee Watershed District is the local water level management authority for Maranacook Lake and is represented on the Committee. In recent years the lake level has risen above full pond for unsatisfactory frequencies and durations and seasonal water levels goals are not being met.

A hydrologic study of the Maranacook Lake watershed was recently completed by Northstar Hydro, Inc. which included developing a hydrologic model of the watershed and a hydraulic model of the dam. The Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam was surveyed in 2014 as part of that study. Some additional survey work is needed on downstream control structures.

#### **Project Summary**

The goal of the study is to provide the Committee with the necessary information to select a specific structural renovation plan for the Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam that will increase outflow capacity and improve water level management capability at the dam in a manner that meets the objectives of:

- reduced peak lake elevations from significant precipitation events,
- lower seasonal average lake levels, and,
- increased lake drawdown capacity.

#### Anticipated project steps:

- 1. Identify potential dam alterations that are structurally feasible at this site.
- 2. Use Northstar Hydro's hydrologic/hydraulic model to predict lake level responses resulting from various configurations of these potential alternatives.
- 3. Survey the Main Street bridge and the dam at the Winthrop Commerce Center building over Mill Stream to determine any flow impacts.
- 4. Select two options that meet the Committee's water level management objectives.
- 5. Develop preliminary designs for those options.
- 6. Develop cost estimates for those options.

#### **Project Timeline**

- Pre-proposal site visit at Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam is Wednesday, June 3, 2015 at 10:00 a.m.
- Questions due Friday, June 5, 2015.
- <u>Proposals due</u> at Winthrop Town Office, **Thursday June 11, 2015 at 3:00 p.m.**. (see 'Submittal Requirements' section).
- Proposals opened at Winthrop Town Office, Thursday, June 11, 2015 at 3:30 p.m.
- Proposals, with recommendations, considered for approval, Monday, June 22, 2015, by Town of Readfield Select Board (6:30 p.m.) and Monday, July 6, 2015, by Town of Winthrop Council (7:00 p.m.).
- Contract signed within 7 days of governing bodies' approval.
- Final Engineering Study products due Friday, November 13, 2015.

### Available Site-specific Resources/data to be used in Maranacook Lake Dam preliminary engineering study

- The *Maranacook Dam Hydrologic Study Report*, February 2015, by Northstar Hydro, Inc. should be reviewed.
- The Maranacook Lake Dam and Watershed hydraulic and hydrologic models developed by Northstar Hydro, Inc. must be used to calculate the changes in outflow which would result from any dam renovations, and to predict the lake level response to such changes.
- Survey data for the Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam is current, provided by Main-Land Development Consultants, 2014, as part of the above-mentioned study. Data are NAVD 1988.
- The Cobbossee Watershed District has been measuring and recording Maranacook Lake surface elevation since 1975 at the lake outlet just upstream of the Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam. Selected data were used to develop and calibrate the hydrologic model.
- The Cobbossee Watershed District (CWD) collects precipitation data at the CWD office in Winthrop, located 0.25 miles from the dam. CWD precipitation data for selected storms were used to produce hydrographs for comparison to recorded water level data for developing and calibrating the model.

#### **Scope of Services**

1. The Contractor will identify dam renovation options that are feasible for this site. Dam renovation options to be considered shall include but not be limited to: installing an additional gate; enlarging the existing gate, including consideration of downstream

streambank erosion controls; lowering spillway elevation; a combination of the above; or other reasonable alternatives.

- 2. The Contractor, in consultation with the Committee, will evaluate dam renovation options using Northstar Hydro's hydrologic/hydraulic model to determine predicted changes in water outflow through the dam, the resultant lake levels, and duration of levels above target levels. The results of these modeled scenarios will be used to evaluate the likelihood of achieving water level goals from such potential modifications to the dam structure.
- 3. The Contractor will survey the Main Street bridge and the dam at the Winthrop Commerce Center building over Mill Stream downstream from the Maranacook Lake Dam. The Contractor will determine how these structures impact water flow at the Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam. At a minimum, survey should include spot elevations of low steel and top of road at Main Street and top of spillway at the Winthrop Commerce Center dam, at NAVD datum.
- 4. The Contractor will consult with the Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam Committee (the Committee) regarding the findings from steps 1 and 3. The contractor will consult with the Committee during the study regarding the hypothetical dam configurations being considered, selected storms and target lake levels to be modeled, the results of modeling such configurations, and selection of which alternatives warrant design and cost estimate development. In addition to telephone and e-mail communication during the study, the Contractor will meet with the Committee at least once during the study.
- 5. The Contractor will develop preliminary design and cost estimates for two options selected by the Committee, with guidance from the Contractor, as mentioned in #4.

#### **Deliverables**

Deliverables are due November 13, 2015.

- 1) A surveyed site plan of the Main Street bridge and adjacent dam under the Winthrop Commerce Center building over Mill Stream.
- 2) A written report describing:
  - a) All dam reconstruction options considered, and reasons for those options selected for modeling, and those options selected for further design and cost development.
  - b) The study's findings, including specific data, regarding modeled outflow and lake levels from the various dam reconstruction options selected for modeling.
  - c) A summary of the benefits, limitations, and cost estimates for the two renovation options.
  - d) Recommendations for the Committee regarding modifications to the dam structure.
- 3) A preliminary design site plan for two options for dam reconstruction.

#### Requirements for Potential Contractors (Proposers):

#### Site visit

1. All Proposers should inform themselves of the Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam. The Towns disclaim any and all responsibility for injury to Proposers, their agents or others while examining the sites or at any other time.

- 2. Interested Proposers are invited to meet with representatives of the Committee at the Maranacook Lake Outlet Dam adjacent to 97 Bowdoin Street, Winthrop, Maine on <u>Wednesday, June 3, 2015, at 10:00 a.m.</u> Parking is available across the street from the dam at the Norcross Point public use area on Bowdoin Street, Winthrop, Maine. Following this meeting, participants can accompany Committee representatives to a second site nearby, the Main Street bridge and adjacent dam at the Winthrop Commerce Center building.
- 3. Proposers may contact the Committee to discuss the possibility of meeting at the site at an alternate date.

#### **Submittal Requirements**

- 1. A written narrative that addresses the above-stated Scope of Services and includes:
  - a. a description of the proposed technical approach, including use of the hydrologic/hydraulic model developed by Northstar Hydro;
  - b. availability to consult with the Committee during the project;
  - c. a description of the final products;
  - d. total cost of services described in this RFP;
  - e. qualifications, including relevant experience of employees that will be assigned to this project.
- 2. The proposal must be signed by the Proposer with its full name and address.
- 3. Each Proposer is required to state in its Proposal: the Proposer's name and place of business and the names of persons or parties interested as principals with it; that the Proposal is made without any connection with any other Proposer making any proposal for the same services; and that no person acting for or employed by either Town is directly or indirectly interested in the Proposal or any agreement which may be entered into to which the Proposal relates or in any portion of the profits therefrom.
- 4. **Proposals are due by 3:00 p.m., Thursday, June 11, 2015**. Proposals received after this scheduled time shall not be considered. Three copies of each proposal must be submitted in sealed envelopes marked as PROPOSAL, Maranacook Lake Dam Renovation Preliminary Engineering Study, to Town Manager, at the Winthrop Town Office, 17 Highland Avenue, Winthrop, Maine, 04364. In addition, an electronic copy in the form of data disk or flash drive, shall be submitted with the hard copies of the proposal. No faxed or emailed proposals will be accepted.
- 5. Proposals will be opened at 3:30 p.m., Thursday, June 11, 2015 at same location. All Proposers are welcome to attend the public opening.

#### Acceptance/Rejection

The Towns reserve the right to reject any or all proposals.

#### Other Requirements

1. Proposers are responsible for all of their costs in preparing and submitting proposals hereunder. No Proposals may be withdrawn within a period of thirty (30) days after the opening of proposals.

- 2. The successful Proposer shall be required to sign an agreement substantially similar to the Town of Readfield's standard Services Agreement, a copy of which is attached as Exhibit 1. Before commencing work under the Services Agreement, the successful Proposer shall produce evidence satisfactory to the Town of insurance coverage and personal property tax payment as required in Exhibit 1.
- 3. All Services to be furnished to the Towns shall be performed with equipment, methods and use of personnel in accordance with the pertinent Occupational and Safety and Health Act requirements of the State of Maine and the United States.

#### INTRODUCTION

At the request of Karen Peterson, Sexton for the Town of Readfield, Maine, a structural inspection was conducted on April 20, 2015 to provide an opinion on the condition of the stone walls at the front of the Readfield Corner Cemetery on Church Road and the Case Cemetery on Main Street, in Readfield, Maine.

Karen Peterson and Grace Keene, the Chair of the Cemetery Committee were present during the inspection. The weather during this inspection was overcast with showers and cool.

The investigation was conducted by, and this report written by, Helen C. Watts, P.E. of Helen Watts Engineering PLLC. A copy of Ms. Watts' resume is included in this report.

#### DESCRIPTION

The Case Cemetery dates from 1789, and is affiliated with an early Baptist church but is now non-denominational. The cemetery is off Route 17. The Readfield Corner Cemetery dates from 1808, and includes three vaults. This cemetery is off Church Road. See the photos attached at the end of the report.

All photos and available documents will be made available on Dropbox as needed.

For the purposes of this report, we have considered the front of the cemeteries to be the side facing towards the road, and left and right as used in this report are as the structures is viewed from the road.

#### STANDARDS AND LIMITATIONS

This inspection report is limited to observations made from visual evidence. No destructive testing was done as part of this investigation. This report is not to be considered a guarantee of condition and no warranty is implied. We are not responsible for conditions that could not be seen or were not within the scope of our services at the time of the inspection.

#### OBSERVATIONS AND EVALUATION

#### Case Cemetery

The Case Cemetery front stone wall is a flanking laid wall; the base is one large stone wide, with the stones abutting, and the stones above are laid one or more stones wide. The stones are generally granite, and most may be from the adjacent fields.

The base stone, and some of those above, are cut to make a vertical front face to the wall. The cuts appear to be made using a star drill and feather wedges, a method that was much faster than the earlier colonial wedge methods, and which was brought into common usage in the first half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century in New England.

The wall is in a left and right section with approximately 113' and 83', respectively. There are tall cut-stones on the inside of the opening to make a decorative entrance. The outside ends of the walls tie into wide dump-fieldstone walls on the left and right sides of the cemetery. Part of the right section has a cut capstone. The wall appears to have been built from right to left, with the large stones laid, then the infill stones and capstone were placed. The better stones and more careful placement of the stones are on the right side.

The wall acts as a low retaining wall, with soil placed up to the capstone for most of the length for the right retaining wall. The left retaining wall has a sloping back side with smaller stones, but has not been backfilled with soil except at the base of the wall.

At some point, some mortar was added to the face of the wall in a repair attempt. I generally recommend that use of mortar be limited in the face of dry-laid stone acting as a retaining wall, as the mortar can hold water from passing through the wall, increasing hydrostatic pressure on the back side of the wall. In the winter, it can also cause movement of the stones through freeze-thaw action. The mortar used here is limited and not likely to cause water retention.

Some work was done recently to cut down vegetation that had been allowed to grow on the back side of the stone wall. I recommend that any vegetation be kept to trimmed grass, as the roots of larger plants can displace stones. Where some of the vegetation included poison ivy, I recommend adding limestone to the soils to make them less acidic, and keeping the grass mowed. Burning and Roundup® are not recommended.

The area where cars park in front of this wall has another dump-fieldstone wall adjacent to the side of Route 17. The grade of the area between the walls indicates that the road

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which is now Route 17 traveled between the two stone walls at the time the cemetery was built, and the grade from the front of the dressed stone wall is rounded and slopes down to the flat area nearer Route 17 where the road was cut into the sloping grade to make it flat.

The slope of the land and the limited mortar help to minimize freeze-thaw conditions that could damage the wall.

There has been limited shifting of the stones over time, with little movement of the major base stones, and some movement probably due to frost or ice in some of the upper stones. A stone mason experienced with stone wall or stone foundation repair can adjust the stones back into the wall. I recommend that the wall be inspected every 5 years, and work planned every 10 years to keep the stones in good placement. This may be work taken on by volunteers, with some training and assistance by the experienced mason to minimize costs.

Readfield Corner Cemetery

The Readfield Corner Cemetery front stone wall is a flanking laid wall; the base is one large stone wide, with the large stones abutting, and the stones above are laid one or more stones wide. The stones are generally granite, and most may be from the adjacent fields.

The base stone, and some of those above, are cut to make a vertical front face to the wall. The cuts appear to be made using a star drill and feather wedges, a method that was much faster than the earlier colonial wedge methods, and which was brought into common usage in the first half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century in New England.

The stone wall is in four sections with approximate lengths of 154', a driving entrance, 68', a stone stair, 74', a driving entrance, a vault and 100'. At the left end, the wall becomes a cast iron fence, and at the right end the wall meets up with the dumpfieldstone wall at the right side of the cemetery.

There are tall cut-stones on the inside of the opening to make decorative entrances. The walls were built with the large stones laid, then the infill stones and capstone were placed.

The wall acts as a low retaining wall, with soil placed up to the capstone for most of the length for the right retaining wall. The left retaining wall has a sloping back side with smaller stones, but has not been backfilled with soil except at the base of the wall.

There are large trees planted regularly approximately 6-8' from the back side of the wall. These are in generally good condition, though not viewed in leaf.

At some point, some mortar was added to the face of the wall in a repair attempt. I generally recommend that use of mortar be limited in the face of dry-laid stone acting as a retaining wall, as the mortar can hold water from passing through the wall, increasing hydrostatic pressure on the back side of the wall. In the winter, it can also cause movement of the stones through freeze-thaw action. The mortar used here is limited and not likely to cause water retention.

These walls show signs of movement due to frost heaving. Parts of the wall are moved toward the front at the base, parts are moved with the top of the wall going to the front. At one point, I reached into a gap in the stones and reached the length of my arm into the wall. Some chinking (smaller, infill) stones have been pushed out to land in the grassed swale in front of the wall.

To make this wall hold its configuration, the drainage at the base of the wall needs to insure that there is no water that can freeze and thaw at the base, which will heave both the large base stones as well as the smaller infill stones, moving them up and down and possibly out towards the front of the wall.

Possible cures for the water would have to be worked out with the owner of the road, because the swale appears to have been made primarily for drainage when the road was built up. The wall would not be in as good a condition if the base of the wall had been subject to the freeze-thaw conditions since it was built, in my opinion, but a possibly 20-year-old swale could have caused the movement in the wall visible now.

One possible drainage method would be to add a perforated drain to cut off the water from near the front of the wall. The drain would need to slope to the right, and drain to open air on the property adjacent to the right side of the cemetery.

Once the drainage is addressed, the walls need to be rebuilt, especially at the right where the swale is lower, if the walls are to be kept with the front face straight. The walls should be evaluated by a stone mason experienced with stone wall or stone foundation repair to determine cost-effective repairs and phasing of the work. There is no point in repairing the wall to a straight condition without dealing with the freeze-thaw condition which is causing the stones to move.

The vaults are generally in good condition on the outside, being durably built with dressed stone. The vaults were not inspected inside. Some of the vaults have limited soil cover over the tops. I recommend treating the tops of the vaults like 'green roofs', roofs planted with vegetation. The top of the stone roof should be uncovered and a 45-mil EPDM (rubber roofing) membrane be placed, then a drainage layer, then a minimum of 6" of lightweight topsoil and 'desert' condition plants such as sedum. The surface of the soil should slope to drain any stormwater off the top of the vault. The roofing membrane can be sealed to the back side of the stone at the top front of the vault to minimize water entering the vault at this point. One site with information on green roofs is <a href="http://stormwater.pca.state.mn.us/index.php/Green">http://stormwater.pca.state.mn.us/index.php/Green</a> roofs combined.

The soils around the vaults should be graded to keep water from collecting near the entrances to the vault as well.

Some sources for contractors that could assist you with this work may be found by calling Gagne and Son (<a href="http://www.gagneandson.com/">http://www.gagneandson.com/</a>) or Somerset Stone and Stove (<a href="http://centralmainestoneworks.com/">http://centralmainestoneworks.com/</a>); both provide materials for masons. These contractors can provide you with a better estimate of the cost of the needed repairs to the walls.

In my opinion, the repairs needed for the Readfield Corner Cemetery front walls will exceed \$100,000, possibly even with a significant volunteer effort.

#### **CONCLUSION**

We have reviewed the condition of the stone walls for the Case and Readfield Corner Cemeteries. While the Case Cemetery front wall is generally well-drained and in need of minor repairs, the Readfield Corner Cemetery wall appears to be moving due to freeze-thaw conditions due to the lack of adequate drainage at the base of the wall, particularly towards the right side. Repairs other than casual replacement of smaller stones fallen into the swale are not recommended until the drainage is addressed.

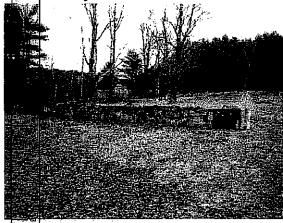

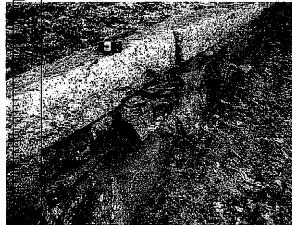

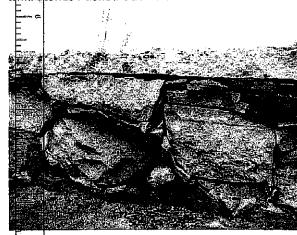

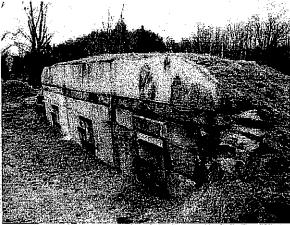
