Dear Readfield Resident,

Transparency in government is critically important and this mailing is intended to provide you with local voting information in a different and more active way in light of the many impacts of COVID-19. This mailing includes the Warrant Articles that will be considered at the Annual Town Meeting / Secret Ballot Vote along with brief explanations and clarification on budgetary and policy matters. The warrant articles are in a standard font, while the notes and comments are in *bold italics*.

Please note that there has been a change in our Annual Town Meeting date and location as a result of COVID-19. In-person secret ballot voting will be held at the Readfield Elementary School Gymnasium at 84 South Road from 8am until 8pm on Tuesday, July 14, 2020. Absentee voting is strongly encouraged as a matter of public health. This method of voting has become increasingly popular over the past few years with over a quarter of residents already voting absentee. Information on absentee voting can be found on the town website or by contacting the Town Office. Similarly, detailed information on the municipal budget can also be found through these channels.

Article 1: Elect a moderator by written ballot to preside at said meeting.

Article 3: Shall the Town of Readfield vote to allow the Select Board to establish Salaries and or Wages of town officers and employees, not elsewhere established, for the period July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021?

Article 4: Shall the Town vote to fix September 25, 2020 or thirty days after the taxes are committed, whichever is later, and February 26, 2021 as the dates upon each of which one-half of the property taxes are due and payable, and as the dates from which interest will be charged on any unpaid taxes at a rate of 9% per year, which is the State rate pursuant to Title 36 MRSA, 505.4? Due dates are similar to past years. The rate is the State's allowable interest rate.

Article 5: Shall the Town vote to authorize the Tax Collector to Pay Interest at a rate of 5%, which is lower than the State Rate of 9%, from the date of overpayment, on any taxes paid and later abated pursuant to Title 36 MRSA, § 506 & 506A? If not voted in the rate would default to the State's allowable interest rate of 7%. Last year it was voted in at 5%.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the municipal officers, If an Article Fails, to spend an amount not to exceed 3/12 of the budgeted amount in each operational budget category that the town is legally obligated to pay, of the last year's approved budgeted amount during the period July 1, 2020 to October 1, 2020?

Article 7: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$ 514,780 for the Administration budget category for the following budget lines with Grant Writing, Heating Assistance and Attorney Fees unexpended balances to be carried forward?

<u>Article 34:</u> Shall the Town vote to authorize the Select Board to expend up to \$25,000 from the Unassigned Fund Balance (General Fund), in the aggregate for one or more purposes as necessary to meet contingencies that may occur during the ensuing fiscal year? *This article sets aside a small contingency to be used for emergencies or unanticipated financial needs.*

<u>Article 35</u>: Shall the Town vote to appropriate \$277,117 from the Unassigned Fund Balance to reduce the total tax commitment? *This use of funds to reduce taxes is estimated to be very close to the threshold for our unassigned fund balance policy.*

<u>Article 36</u>: Shall the town vote to authorize the Select Board to make emergency expenditure reductions and if necessary transfers from the Unassigned Fund Balance (General Fund) up to \$200,000 in total pursuant as necessary to meet projected revenue shortfalls due to coronavirus emergency to the extent authorized by state law during the ensuing fiscal year? *This article grants the Select Board emergency authority to address an urgent revenue shortfall preemptively by acting swiftly to fiscally protect the town and its residents. The Board envisions first making spending cuts and, only if necessary, moving limited funds from the unassigned fund balance while not endangering a responsible level of operating reserves. Approval now by secret ballot will ensure the broadest input by voters regarding the town's ability to address rapidly changing economic conditions.*

<u>Article 37</u>: Shall the Town authorize the purchase and conversion of existing streetlights to energy saving LED fixtures, authorize the installation of up to four new streetlights, and authorize an associated multi-year contract with Central Maine Power?

<u>Article 39:</u> Shall an ordinance entitled Town of Readfield Food Sovereignty Ordinance, be enacted? (A copy of said Ordinance is attached to this Warrant.) *The ordinance will support local agriculture, food processing, and business, while expanding consumer rights and responsibilities.*

<u>Article 40:</u> Shall an ordinance entitled 2020 Amendments to the Town of Readfield Administration Ordinance, be enacted? (A copy of said Ordinance is attached to this Warrant.) *These amendments clarify administrative functions, remove language that is in conflict with State law, and improves the organization of the existing ordinance.*

<u>Article 41:</u> Shall an ordinance entitled 2020 Amendments to the Town of Readfield Land Use Ordinance, be enacted? (A copy of said Ordinance is attached to this Warrant.) *These changes amend and clarify the existing Land Use Ordinance*.

NOTE ON ARTICLES 42 - 49: Articles 42 - 48 give residents the option of which marijuana related businesses, if any, to allow in Readfield, subject to the regulations and controls established by Ordinance in Article 49. Articles 42-48 allow selective approval of various business types while Article 49 considers the overall Ordinance that governs the activities described in Articles 42-48. Any activity approved under articles 42-48 will only be enacted if Article 49 is also approved.

<u>Article 42:</u> Shall the Town vote to allow Medical Marijuana Manufacturing Facilities subject to the provisions of the Marijuana Establishments Ordinance to be considered under Article 49, if approved? *This article is asking if the voters would like to approve manufacturing facilities for MEDICAL cannabis use. Manufacturing means turning cannabis from dried flower into edibles, tinctures, etc. Manufacturing facilities would be subject to the approval of the overall ordinance, described in Article 49.*

<u>Article 43:</u> Shall the Town vote to allow Medical Marijuana Testing Facilities subject to the provisions of the Marijuana Establishments Ordinance to be considered under Article 49, if approved? *This article is asking if the voters would like to approve testing facilities for MEDICAL cannabis use. Testing facilities evaluate potency and purity of cannabis products. Testing facilities would be subject to the approval of the overall ordinance, described in Article 49.*

<u>Article 44:</u> Shall the Town vote to allow Medical Marijuana Registered Caregiver Retail Stores subject to the provisions of the Marijuana Establishments Ordinance to be considered under Article 49, if approved? *This article is asking if the voters would like to approve registered caregiver retail facilities for MEDICAL cannabis use. These facilities provide medicine to patients in a "storefront" manner. Retail caregiver facilities would be subject to the approval of the overall ordinance, described in Article 49.*

<u>Article 45:</u> Shall the Town vote to allow Adult Use Marijuana Cultivation Facilities subject to the provisions of the Marijuana Establishments Ordinance to be considered under Article 49, if approved? *This article is asking if the voters would like to approve cultivation facilities for ADULT USE cannabis. Cultivation facility details (size, limitations, licenses) are described in the overall ordinance in Article 49.*

<u>Article 46:</u> Shall the Town vote to allow Adult Use Marijuana Products Manufacturing Facilities subject to the provisions of the Marijuana Establishments Ordinance to be considered under Article 49, if approved? *This article is asking if the voters would like to approve manufacturing facilities for ADULT USE cannabis. Manufacturing includes creating edibles, tinctures, and concentrates. Manufacturing facility details (size, limitations, licenses) are described in the overall ordinance in Article 49.*

<u>Article 47:</u> Shall the Town vote to allow Adult Use Marijuana Testing Facilities subject to the provisions of the Marijuana Establishments Ordinance to be considered under Article 49, if approved? *This article is asking if the voters would like to approve testing facilities for ADULT USE cannabis. Testing facilities test the potency and purity of adult use cannabis. Testing facility details (size, limitations, licenses) are described in the overall ordinance in Article 49.*

<u>Article 48:</u> Shall the Town vote to allow Adult Use Marijuana Retail Stores subject to the provisions of the Marijuana Establishments Ordinance to be considered under Article 49, if approved? *This article is asking if the voters would like to approve retail facilities for ADULT USE cannabis. Retail facilities would offer cannabis products to adults over 21. Retail facility details (size, limitations, licenses) are described in the overall ordinance in Article 49.*

<u>Article 49:</u> Shall an ordinance entitled Town of Readfield Marijuana Establishments Ordinance, be enacted? (A copy of said Ordinance is attached to this Warrant.) *This is the ordinance that governs all marijuana related business in Readfield, if approved.*

<u>Article 50</u>: Should the Town continue to use the Secret Ballot process for the 2021 Annual Town Meeting? *This is an advisory vote that the Select Board will consider when determining whether to continue with secret ballot voting next year.*
