Budget Process Summary


- Over a dozen meetings and presentations to develop and discuss the budget since October.
- Review and comment by members of the public, Boards and Committees, the Budget Committee, and the Select Board.
- Review of budget details for all departments and divisions.
- Review of 5-year capital plans.
- There is a lot of uncertainty due to COVID-19 but significant action was taken to mitigate this.
- The Municipal portion of the mil rate is set to go down.


Municipal Building Projects Update

- The Library roof replacement and Fire Station projects are well underway.
- The Library roof repair is expected to be completed in June, with the Fire Station expansion finishing up in the fall.
- The current year budget includes an additional \$100,000 in new revenue and expenditures to fully complete these projects.
- The total cost will be \$925,000 \$975,000

Revenue Highlights

- Conservative increase in valuation of 1/2% applied to baseline revenue estimates.
- State Rev. Sharing is estimated to be at \$200,000, despite initial State forecasts of \$291,147.
- Other revenue estimates have been dropped, totaling about \$23,000 in additional reductions relative to conservative prior-year numbers.
- Use of Designated Funds up by \$99,291.
- Use of Undesignated Funds up by \$19,629.
- Estimated 20% increase in Transfer Station fees





Expense Highlights


- Administration
 - Insurance, labor, and technology costs are up
 - Increase in Assessing time and cost
 - An additional \$12,000 has been added to Legal
- Maintenance
 - The department is up \$10,195 reflecting increased focus on repair work to reduce capital outlays
- Boards & Commissions
 - Functionally split up in Warrant

Expense Highlights

- Community Services
 - \$2,000 increase in Animal Control, mostly due to, increase in KVHS shelter costs
- Recreation, Parks, & Activities
 - Increase of \$4,000 in beach maintenance.
 - \$5,776 net increase in Rec. budget
 - \$5,000 reduction in Heritage Days as it is now an annual event


Expense Highlights


- Roads & Drainage
 - As with other departments there is an increase in maintenance costs (15%)
- Capital Improvements
 - Reduction from last year's high but still considering several projects, pending COVID-19
 - Supported by 5-year Capital Investment Plan
- Solid Waste
 - 4% increase in operating budget, facility maintenance is a priority



Fund Highlights

- We have a 2/12 policy for Undesignated Funds and will hew closely to this threshold in FY21
- Use of fund balance contribute to stability in the mil rate and offset some capital expenditures
- Current and budget year balances are conservative and "curtailed"
- Use of Designated Funds up by \$99,291
- Use of Undesignated Funds up by \$19,629
- Increases in use of funds are the result of uncertainty in revenue due to COVID-19





Municipal Budget Highlights

- Budgeted municipal expenses decreased by \$406,084 to \$2,589,499.
- Budgeted municipal revenues (outside of property tax revenues) also decreased to match expenses.
- The net municipal tax impact is anticipated to be down by \$13,679.
- The municipal portion of the mil rate is expected to decrease from 3.55 to 3.50 mils, and account for about 18% of property taxes.

School & County Budget Highlights

- School budget information is available on their website at www.maranacook.org/budget
- The school budget is projected to decrease by a small amount, and accounts for about 76% of property taxes
- The County budget will likely increase slightly and account for about 6% of property taxes
