## Readfield Roadside Clean-Up Returns for 2021

The annual Readfield Roadside Clean-up returns for May 2021! Take part in a great community effort to keep our roads, sidewalks, and walkways free of trash, garbage, and debris. Dedicated to late Select Board member, John Parent, the Roadside Cleanup Day is just another way that we get #ReadfieldTogether.

Like last year, the cleanup will span the entire month of May, with Saturdays designated as drop-off and pick -up days at the Transfer Station. Volunteers who are interested are encouraged to adopt a road and clean it up at their own pace. We use a program called "Signup Genius" to help us coordinate this effort, online. This is a safe, trusted service that helps us know which roads are clean, and which ones still need help! To choose which road(s) you want to volunteer to clean **SIGN-UP HERE**! https://

Cleanup bags, debris grabbers, and other supplies will be available at the Transfer Station - just ask an attendant for help!

We want you to be safe, so we ask that you wear comfortable and appropriate Maine spring clothing, gloves, and BRIGHT COLORS (either yellow or orange safety clothing) so motorists can clearly see you. Volunteers are encouraged to use appropriate social distancing (6 feet) when working together.

Bagged waste can be brought to the Transfer Station any Saturday in May. Just let the attendant know that you are bringing in waste from the cleanup. Unfortunately, bagged waste from the cleanup effort cannot be accepted on any other transfer station days.

If you find items that won't fit into a bag, are too bulky, or require a fee at the transfer station (tires etc), please contact the Town Office and they will arrange for pick up. Email Kristin Parks or call 685-4939

#### Dear Neighbors;

With many of us vaccinated and guidelines changing in relation to the pandemic, the future is looking brighter. This board and many town committees kept the work of governance in motion with Zoom meetings and other efforts.

However, there's hands-on work that is vital and necessary in operating a town like Readfield and I invite you to focus on our town staff. They made a big difference in our day-to-day lives during this uncertain period and our recognition of their adaptations, can-do efforts, and care about the services we depend on is greatly warranted.

# From the Town Manager

#### Town Manager's Report - Budget Process and Secret Ballot / Town Meeting Update

Thank you to all of the residents, volunteers, and staff who have been working together to move our town forward through the last several months of the budget and warrant process, despite the many compounding challenges created by the COVID-19 pandemic. Since our last budget process we have found that the financial and economic impacts of the Coronavirus have fortunately been in most cases less than anticipated. We were prepared for the worst however and that positioning during the current fiscal year put the town on a strong footing to prepare a municipal budget that anticipates a reduction in the financial impact on taxpayers this coming year. The Regional School Unit #38 budget is anticipated to see a small increase of .7%, and I want to thank our School Board members and the RSU #38 Administration for their efforts to keep the increase as small as possible. When combined, we expect a small net decrease in the amount of taxes paid by property owners. Here are some summary points:

Municipal revenue projections were revised to account for the milder than expected impacts of COVID-19. Most non-tax revenue streams are up.

Assigned and unassigned municipal fund balances were applied in a way that utilized available surpluses while staying on target with our reserve policies.

We are continuing to focus on investing in our physical infrastructure like building and equipment, but also increasing investment in our many recreational resources and properties.

Budgeted municipal expenditures will remain elevated in a few key areas - Poverty Abatements and General Assistance. We know a lot of people will still need help, and these are two of the primary resources we can offer as a town.

The municipal portion of tax bills went down as projected revenues exceed expenses.

Moving on from what financial matters voters will consider on their ballots I want to briefly address how, when, and where they will do so. While public health appears to be headed in the right direction we are not out of the woods yet and the Town is pursuing steps to ensure that public activities can happen safely and efficiently. Here are a few key dates and details:

#### RULES OF THE READFIELD TOWN BEACH

- 1. All users of the property are required to have a season permit or purchase a guest pass.
- 2. All users of beach, water and property assume all risk. There is **NO LIFEGUARD** available at any time.
- 3. Beach hours: 9:00 am 8:00 pm.
- 4. All attendants have the right to stop any behavior which they feel is dangerous.
- 5. All posted public health rules must be followed.
- 6. All children 14 and under must be supervised by an adult remaining on the property at all times.
- 7. When arriving at Beach please:
  - a. Drive slowly and use caution in parking area
  - b. Show permit to attendant on duty (or purchase day pass from attendant)
  - c. Keep permit visible on dashboard at all times
- 8. Possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages or drugs is prohibited.
- 9. No glass of any kind is allowed on the property.
- 10. No animals of any kind are allowed on the property.
- 11. All boats (including windsurfers, canoes, and kayaks) are to be kept out of the swim area, and may come ashore on the west side of the beach, outside the buoys.
- 12. No fishing allowed within the beach buoy area.
- 13. No swimming beyond the buoys and no rough play anywhere.
- 14. The use of floats and rafts in the swim area will be limited by the discretion of the attendant on duty.
- 15. Swimming diapers are required for all children wearing diapers. Soiled swimsuits or diapers may not be rinsed out in the lake. Failure to provide a swim diaper for your child while in the water is cause for immediate revoking of your permit.
- 16. There are no trash cans available anywhere on the Beach property; therefore we have a "carry-in, carry-out" policy for all trash.
- 17. There is absolutely no tobacco use or vaping allowed anywhere on the property.
- 18. All holes dug in the sand must be filled in when play is finished.
- 19. Permit holders wishing to have any group function should call the Readfield Town Office at 207-685-4939 in advance to arrange fees and schedule times.
- 20. No inappropriate language of any kind will be allowed.
- 21. All music must be kept to a level as to not to disturbed others using the beach.
- 22. All grill fires need to be doused with water before leaving.

## AGING FRIENDLY UPDATE



#### **Good News**

The Age Friendly Committee recently was awarded a small grant from the **Maine Community Foundation** to improve the trails at the Fairgrounds, help with site preparation for the historical pulling stone exhibition and to add a bench atop of the hill overlooking Maranacook Lake. We are grateful to the generous donor who will make these improvements possible.

#### Reminder About the Trails

When people hear the word trails in Maine they likely envision hiking across roots and stones and negotiating all kinds of obstacles. This is not the case at the Readfield Fairgrounds. The trails are made of bluestone. Many of them are flat and can accommodate strollers and meet ADA guidelines. They are "friendly" trails. If you haven't been on them, give them a try. They are a gem for the community.

#### **COVID Vaccinations**

Hopefully, Readfield residents have been able to get vaccinated. However, if anyone is having trouble getting to a vaccination site the Department of Health and Human Services is offering free rides to and from appointments for people who otherwise would struggle to get to a vaccination site. Additionally, people who don't have access to the internet or otherwise need help getting an appointment can call the Community Vaccination Line at 1-888-445-4111. It is available Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Translation services are available through this line. Deaf and hard of hearing individuals may dial 711 and ask to be connected to the number above. And finally, the DHHS is working with home health agencies to vaccinate homebound older Mainers and starting to provide vaccine doses to independent primary care practices. If someone can-

not leave their home, and they want a vaccination, call the number above.



## FROM THE TRAILS

Our main news this month is that we are welcoming two new members to our committee. Steve Hayes and Jackie Drouin were appointed by the Select Board at their April meeting. Both are regular trail users and we are glad to have their enthusiastic participation as we maintain existing trails and develop new ones. Even with these appointments we still have a couple of openings we would like to fill. So if you are interested in joining please contact the town office for the appropriate paper work. If you would like to discuss what we do please feel free to call me at 207-458-4259 or our chair, Greg Durgin, at 685-4481. If you are averse to meetings but would like to help with trail work we would also be interested in including you as one of our volunteers. Just let us know.

The only trail work accomplished recently is some upgrades to the Esker Trail and sign replacement on the Fairgrounds Trail. Although the Esker Trail is already one of our driest trails, we have done some minor re-routing, and put down some additional wood chips to smooth the trail and deal with potential wet areas. If you haven't visited this trail yet, it begins behind the small cement block building on the south side of the parking lot for the Maranacook School Bus Garage (just north of the access road to the transfer station). The trail is about a two mile round-trip walk to the esker terminus and back to the parking lot. On the way it crosses the transfer station access road, goes past the sand/salt shed, crosses the shed access road, and continues out to and around the town's closed landfill. It includes views of the grassed-over landfill and a bog area. It is a mostly natural surface trail that is also suitable for biking. The trail is mostly on town property but private landowners have graciously allowed us access to the land where the trail ends at a large bog.

May is a great month to be out on our trails as the greenery comes back and bird migrations reach their peak. We hope you are able to go out and enjoy both along with the warmer weather!



#### Roadside Cleanup in Readfield

#### Readfield Awarded Maine Food Composting Grant

We are now receiving supplies, equipment and signage for our new food composting program at the Readfield Transfer Station. We are working to prepare the site and coordinate efforts with or partners at KVCOG, UMaine and Maine DEP. Be on the lookout for changes in the compost area.

Materials will become available in late May for us to begin this exciting program to divert food waste from our 'trash' and to create valuable useable compost for our residents.

#### Change of Operation Practices continue due to Covid-19

We will continue to operate meeting standards from the Maine government including the following practices:

- All vehicles must stop at the Attendant Booth to speak with an employee about what materials you
  are bringing in, to receive directions on where to dispose of these materials, and to pay any
  required fee. Paying by check is preferred and if using cash to please have exact change and place
  it in the mailbox within easy reach for the driver.
- Please wear a face covering at all times while at the Transfer Station.
- Please leave when you are finished to avoid making the space congested.
- Please do not approach the employees within 6'. Our goal is to maintain social distancing for their health and safety.

#### **News From The Broadband Committee**

The committee met twice in April, once to discuss progress being made with the regional group, the WKLCBA, and secondly, to discuss a report created by one of our members. Both meetings were informative and are helping us to understand where the town is currently with regards to broadband and how best to determine a path forward. We now have a page on the town website for this initiative to make finding information easier.

Our first meeting consisted primarily of a discussion about where the WKLCBA is currently headed. That group is having a financial and operating proforma created for the member towns as a group so we can see if there are indeed cost savings for combining our efforts as a regional group. Then we can decide if Readfield is interested in pursuing advancements together or just as one town. We expect to have that information by the beginning of June.

Our second meeting was a presentation, created by one of our committee members who works in the communications industry, of a report detailing the services currently provided in town by Spectrum/Charter and Consolidated and what options exist for expansion with each company, along with an analysis of how various solutions we have been looking at would affect the town in terms of costs and risk factors. It was an excellent presentation that was easy to understand, full of a lot of information to digest. We will discuss this at our next meeting and have our consultant with us to address issues that were raised.

All meetings are public and will be held on Zoom for the near future. Look for links on the town website and for email alerts if you have signed up for them. Signup for email alerts is available on the town website. We will publish monthly updates of our progress.

#### **Town Meeting Question on Broadband**

The Select Board has approved an article on this year's town meeting warrant concerning broadband in Readfield. This is a non-binding question that will assist the town in understanding how to best plan for and prioritize for Readfield's future. This is a chance for every voting resident to register their input on this subject. It is the voting body of the town that determines where funds are spent and what projects are approved. Please be sure to vote this year and let the Select Board know what you want.

Article 40: The following is a non-binding question to establish interest and guidance for future town considerations: Should the Select Board in 2021 and 2022 pursue the establishment of a fiber to the home high speed internet network available to all residents?

WE KNOW -----ALL LIVES MATTER

WE JUST NEED YOUR HELP

WITH #BLACK LIVES MATTER

FOR BLACK LIVES are in DANGER!

Why are black lives (and now Asian lives) in danger? What do I need to know and understand? How did this happen? How am I unknowingly (and maybe knowingly) contributing?

I want to help but I can't if I don't understand how and why we got here, so I was really glad to take advantage of a small group (in a safe space) who have gathered on Zoom to struggle together to learn about systemic racism and what it really means in our country.

Though I believed I was not racist, I discovered many ways in which I am. I learned through powerful books and short videos that when I have no understanding of black culture/language/religion or when I try not to see and recognize their color or when I don't learn how to pronounce their name correctly or when I see them as likely unintelligent or a potential physical threat or so many other things, I am denying that they are persons worthy of everything I am worthy of.

I have now only begun to understand my white privilege and how this reality truly makes them second class citizens in every aspect of life. This journey of awareness feels to me like the most important thing I can do right now.

## Town of Readfield Covid -19 Updates
