From the Conservation Commission



Readfield Bird Walk held on May 7

About 15 birders showed up on a chilly Saturday morning and spread over several locations to check for spring birds in our area. A very respectable total of 49 species were spotted or heard. There were the familiar robins, chickadees, loons, sparrows, and lingering winter ducks, but also some nice spring sightings: newly arrived hermit thrush, eastern phoebe, broad-winged hawk, and osprey were welcome. A ruffed grouse was

drumming his mating call. We missed seeing a sandhill crane, but they are around.

Special spring arrivals are the beautiful warblers, and we recorded 8 species: ovenbird, black and white, black-throated green, black-throated blue, yellow-rumped, common yellow-throat, and yellow warbler.

Readfield is fortunate to have accessible and varied habitats where birds and other critters can be enjoyed. We hope to do it again next spring, and welcome all to join us. Thank-you to leaders Howard and Brenda Lake,

Tom Danielson, and Andy Walsh.

RULES OF THE READFIELD TOWN BEACH

- 1. All users of the property are required to have a season permit or purchase a guest pass.
- 2. All users of beach, water and property assume all risk. There is **NO LIFEGUARD** available at any time.
- 3. Beach hours: 9:00 am 8:00 pm.
- 4. All attendants have the right to stop any behavior which they feel is dangerous.
- 5. All posted public health rules must be followed.
- 6. All children 14 & under must be supervised by an adult remaining on the property at all times.
- 7. When arriving at Beach please:
- 8. Drive slowly and use caution in parking area
- 9. Show permit to attendant on duty (or purchase day pass from attendant)
- 10.Keep permit visible on dashboard at all times
- 11. Possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages or drugs is prohibited.
- 12. No glass of any kind is allowed on the property.
- 13. No animals of any kind are allowed on the property.
- 14. All boats (including windsurfers, canoes, and kayaks) are to be kept out of the swim area, and may come ashore on the west side of the beach, outside the buoys.
- 15. No fishing allowed within the beach buoy area.
- 16. No swimming beyond the buoys and no rough play anywhere.
- 17. The use of floats and rafts in the swim area will be limited by the discretion of the attendant on duty.
- 18. Swimming diapers are required for all children wearing diapers. Soiled swimsuits or diapers may not be rinsed out in the lake. Failure to provide a swim diaper for your child while in the water is cause for immediate revoking of your permit.
- 19. There are no trash cans available anywhere on the Beach property; therefore we have a "carry-in, carry-out" policy for all trash.
- 20. There is absolutely no tobacco use or vaping allowed anywhere on the property.
- 21. All holes dug in the sand must be filled in when play is finished.
- 22. Permit holders wishing to have any group function should call the Readfield Town Office at 207-685-4939 in advance to arrange fees and schedule times.
- 23. No inappropriate language of any kind will be allowed.
- 24. All music must be kept to a level as to not to disturbed others using the beach.
- 25. All grill fires need to be doused with water before leaving.

READFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY



Evelyn Adell Potter was recognized as the RHS Volunteer of the Year at the annual meeting on April 30th. She was born at Readfield Depot in 1930 where she resided until 1945, when she moved to Kents Hill and has remained there ever since. Among the positions Potter has held was administrative assistant to three Headmasters at Kents Hill School; she worked in the Readfield Tax Assessor's office for several years; and for a local pediatrician. She also served on the Town of Readfield Old Records Committee in the 1970s and 1980s, and participated in the first history walks during those years. Wherever Evelyn goes she enjoys meeting people and sharing stories about Readfield's history. Her

earliest ancestors settled in East Readfield about 1775 and her family has now lived in Readfield for ten consecutive generations. Evelyn was one of the RHS founding members in 1985 and she has remained involved ever since by assisting visitors with research, making and indexing scrapbooks and helping with recording and transcribing oral histories. She is also the RHS Historian and Corresponding Secretary and rarely misses opportunities to serve as a docent. At age 91 she is still going strong and continues to be proud of her town.

The first in person annual meeting since 2019 was held on April 30th at which the membership elected the following officers: Bob Harris, president; Andy Tolman, VP; Chris Sammons, treasurer; Dale Potter-Clark, secretary; Jeanne Harris, Melanie Lanctot and Greg Durgin. 
Please contact me if you are interested in volunteering for trail work or would consider joining the Readfield Trails Committee.

This summer, the Library is pleased to offer a wonderful opportunity for Readfield residents to enjoy to Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens in Boothbay for FREE! This pass program is made possible by ARPA GARDENS 2021 grant funds administered through the Maine State Library that the Library received.

How the Library Pass Program works:

The Readfield Library may schedule two adults plus any number of their children/grandchildren under the age of 18 on EACH calendar day during the summer season (May through October). Maranacook Area Food Pantry (MAFP)

The MAFP continues its weekly mission of supplying food boxes to local families that face food insecurity. Presently we are servicing 20-22 families per week. Our pantry committee does so, not in a void, but with partners both local and "from away"!

Members of the Readfield United Methodist Church routinely drop of boxes of donated items to the Readfield Town Office to help keep our shelves stocked. Augusta Food Pantry supplies us with 16 "kid packs" weekly that a community volunteer picks up and brings to the middle school. These packs are filled with healthy snacks that go to the families that have children and are a great supplement to the standard boxes. Farmer Kev's LLC from West Gardiner has been with us from March, 2020 providing bi weekly bags of fresh vegetables and fruit. He also encourages his vendors to support our pantry financially! A few weeks ago a local business, Homestead Healers owned by the Vatistas family, approached us with a desire to supply eggs every other week at minimal cost to the pantry. Winthrop Food Pantry calls us when they have extra commodities that they can share. Food insecurity research often points out that eggs and fresh produce are often missing in the diets of individuals needing food assistance. As we have mentioned before, at holiday time we have wonderful support from the Lions Club and Highbrow in Manchester.

There are also folks that work behind the scenes that should be highlighted that give support in a variety of ways that are essential to the running of the pantry. From Readfield, residents Bob Petersen is always on the lookout to help with extra supplies and contacts from Mt. Vernon Food Bank. Jill Harriman makes the bi-weekly trek to West Gardiner to bring us the fresh vegetables from Farmer Kev. Mt. Vernon resident and retired Maranacook staff member Mary Anne Libby has from the get go logged all monetary donations and written thank you notes to donors. Kim Bowie, a mentor at the middle school from Manchester and Katie Baker and Nancy Durgin from Readfield donate their time on Wednesdays to pack the boxes that are distributed on Thursdays. Wayne resident Jim Perkins picks up the weekly boxes that go to Wayne residents who aren't able to drive to Readfield.

Readfield's Sonya Clark picks up and delivers weekly bread donations for all our families. As I mentioned in an earlier Messenger, there are numerous folks who drop off food and /or financial assistance at a school or a town office and escape without any recognition but we appreciate their help.

The Maranacook Education Foundation / Rick Wilson is and has been a major source of lining up funding through their contacts. Wayne resident and school volunteer Lee Behrendt helps with box distribution on Thursdays. He is joined by staff members Nick Lopez, Kim Fletcher, Adam Scarpone, and Mary Ellen Tracy who distribute and make weekly deliveries to families.

The MAFP would like to make a special mention of appreciation to RSU # 38 Payroll Specialist Lynn Sawtelle for her expertise, dedication, and professionalism in handling the too-numerous-to count financial transactions for the MAFP account for about three years without ever missing a beat! We wish her all the best in her new adventure!

News from the Broadband Committee



Town Meeting Questions on Broadband

On November 2nd 2021 voters in Readfield spoke loud and clear by approving three articles concerning bringing Internet service to all locations in our town.

There were 1015 residents who voted out of approximately 2300 registered voters. Of those who filled in a choice the results ranged from 70% to 78% approval. These votes have provided a clear direction to

the Select Board and Broadband Committee. Both groups are committed to a prompt follow-through by assessing the available solutions and choosing the best and most equitable one to be presented at a Town Meeting in 2022.

News From the Broadband Committee June 2022

The committee met on April 27th and May 11th. We discussed the ongoing negotiations with Axiom along with informational documents for the public and provided suggestions to the Town Manager for consideration. There were two residents in attendance at our May meeting. Questions were asked and answered. The committee urges all residents to express their desires by voting on June 14th.

The Select Board and Budget Committee have approved placing a Broadband article on the Town Warrant for the June 14th Annual Town Meeting. The article asks the town to enter a contract with a preferred vendor to build the fiber optic network throughout Readfield and then to operate the network on a long-term basis. This contract will provide 1-Gigabyte symmetrical fiber service to all locations, excellent customer service and network repair service, along with very affordable consumer pricing.

The contract has been developed and is undergoing legal review currently. If approved by voters the Town will be ready to move forward.

Readfield Fiber is a series of web pages explaining all about our proposed fiber network. Look for the link on the front page of the Town Website <u>readfieldmaine.org</u> or directly at <u>readfieldfiber.squarespace.com</u>

The committee is meeting next on June 15th. We will be discussing how to move forward based on the outcome of the secret ballot vote at town meeting. All meetings are public and will be held in person at the Town Office along with remote access. Look for links on the town website and for email alerts if you have signed up for them. 

Healthy Living for ME Announces Several Free Workshops Beginning in June

Registration Open to Adult Mainers of All Ages

Statewide - Mainers are invited to register for Healthy Living for ME's free summer workshops which begin in June. The workshops that are now open for registration include A Matter of Balance, Living Well for Better Health, Better Health Now, Living Well with Chronic Pain, and Living Well with HIV+.

Mainers who are caregivers or supports for individuals living with conditions addressed in these workshops are also invited to participate. Healthy Living for ME also welcomes referrals from healthcare providers; these evidence-based workshops can help patients manage and prevent conditions before they become more serious or result in emergency situations.

"The workshops we are offering this summer address a variety of health conditions and concerns. Mainers who deal with these health issues can benefit not only from the information presented in the workshop, but also from being a part of a supportive group of people who may be in a similar situation. If you think you could benefit from one of our June workshops, please call us to ask any questions, or to register," said Jen Paquet, Training Manager of Healthy Living for ME.

The schedule and details for Healthy Living for ME's June workshops are as follows:

Healthy

- **A Matter of Balance (in-person)** This workshop will be held at the Alfond Youth & Community Center in Waterville beginning June 6, 2022. Topics covered include practical strategies to reduce fear of falling and increase activity levels.
- Living Well for Better Health (in-person) There will be three sessions of this workshop offered; the first begins on June 7, 2022 and will be held at SeniorsPlus in Lewiston. The second begins on June 16, 2022 and will be held at the Caribou Wellness Center in Caribou. The third begins on June 22, 2022 and will be held at Mt. Ararat High School in Topsham. The workshop helps participants deal with ongoing conditions such as diabetes, COPD, arthritis, and high blood pressure. Topics covered include: handling frustration, fatigue, pain and isolation; appropriate exercise for maintaining and improving strength, flexibility, and endurance; appropriate use of medications; communicating effectively with family, friends, and health professionals; nutrition; and evaluating new treatments.
- Better Health Now (by phone) This workshop will begin on June 9, 2022. It is designed to help those living with chronic conditions, including heart disease, arthritis, diabetes, or other conditions. Participants in this workshop receive a toolkit in the mail and work with a leader either by themselves or in small groups. Topics covered during the workshop include: techniques to deal with frustration, fatigue, pain, and isolation; appropriate exercise for maintaining and improving strength, flexibility, and endurance; appropriate use of medications, communicating effectively with family, friends, and health professionals; nutrition; and how to evaluate new treatments.
- Living Well with Chronic Pain (in-person) -This workshop will be held at the Alfond Youth & Community Center in Waterville beginning June 16, 2022. It is designed for people who are dealing with persistent pain such as back pain, post-surgical pain, headaches, and other ongoing pain. Topics covered include: dealing with frustration, fatigue, isolation, and poor sleep; appropriate exercise for maintaining and improving strength; appropriate use of medications; communicating effectively with family, friends, and health professionals; nutrition; pacing activity and rest; and evaluating new treatments.
- Living Well with HIV+ (online) This workshop will be offered virtually beginning June 16, 2022. It is designed for individuals managing HIV and their caregivers/natural supports. Topics covered include medication management; techniques to deal with frustration, fear, fatigue, pain and isolation; communicating effectively with family, friends, and health professionals; sex, intimacy, and disclosure; nutrition; evaluating symptoms; advanced directives; and decision-making. Program participants make weekly action plans, share experiences, and help each other solve problems they encounter in creating and carrying out their self-management program.

For virtual workshops, participants who do not have the necessary technology may be eligible to borrow an iPad from Healthy Living for ME in order to participate.
