Readfield Comprehensive Plan Update (Update)

The Comprehensive Plan (Comp Plan) serves as a road map for our community. The ongoing plan update process is a chance for residents to talk about our town and its future. Maranacook Area Food Pantry (MAFP) News

In last month's *Messenger*, I attempted to recognize the many individuals and groups that help make the MAFP run as smoothly as it does helping families in our RSU # 38 towns. There were so many and space was limited, that the decision was made to do Part 2. Here it is and Thank You to all!

Generally when thinking about a food pantry, the focus falls to the food. Makes sense until you delve a little deeper and discover the layers underneath. A prime example is boxes. Yes, boxes. For 28 months, we have been providing food items to families packed in boxes which totals over 2,240 units. The "Queen of Boxes" is Maranacook's retired nurse Sandy Hunter. She has the knack of getting the boxes we need every week. She and husband Bruce also do home deliveries for the pantry.

Middle School music teacher and advisor Adam Scarpone and his "gang" of 11 kids every week scour the school for excess fresh milk cartons and vegetables that might ordinarily be discarded, and add them to the mix for the families. The student helpers are listed below.

Invoices have to be paid and our appreciation goes out to Phyllis Cote in the Middle School office who gets the paperwork in order to send to the Central Office where Katie Putnam takes over and gets checks out to the vendors and appropriate individuals. A very smooth operation, indeed.

Rosemary Baker from the Middle School staff organizes the collection and delivery of eggs donated by several farmers in the area.

Nancy Perkins coordinates getting the food donations from the Torsey Church to Kristin Parks in the town office who sets up pick up times for transfer to the Middle School.

We have a new volunteer to the pantry as of a couple of weeks go. Thank you Kellie Cameron from Readfield. I hope I have not missed anyone and their contribution to the MAFP.

Our pantry is open every Thursday for curbside pick up from 3:30 to 4:30 at the Middle School lower parking lot. No appointment necessary.

TWO NEW BOOKS WITH READFIELD HISTORY FOR SALE IN RHS GIFT SHOP

Escape from Bunker Hill by Dale Potter-Clark; 350 pgs includes appendix; \$16.95

Dr. Joseph & Myra Mitchell orchestrate the 1,500 mile escape of slaves from Bunker Hill Plantation in Jacksonville, FL to central Maine. The Mitchells really existed but the storyline sprung from the author's imagination as she researched their home in Readfield. A 35 pg. appendix provides information about the Mitchells and other people, places and things that were also in existence during that era and are part of the storyline. A few of those true characters include Samuel Fessenden and Reuben Ruby of Portland, ME; Dr. Ingalls Kittredge of Beverly, MA and Readfield landowner; William Still of Philadelphia, PA; and Rev. NEWS & NOTES FROM THE TRAILS

Trails Committee members report continued growth in the number of residents and visitors using our trails in town and at the Esker trail on North Road. This uptick in usage started during the pandemic when folks just needed to get out and "do something" when our normal routines were upended. This feeling certainly is not confined to Readfield by any means, but many health experts believe outdoor recreation can just help lighten the load of daily living especially during trying times.

The Trails Committee recently received 2 significant monetary donations from residents that will provide some nice amenities to our trails. These donations supplement our budget that was recently passed at the town meeting vote in June. Thank you to the voters who support our mission and to our donors.

One of our committee members, Nancy Buker, recently brought the concept of water trails to one of our meetings. These "trails" are also known as "blueways" and are marked routes on navigable waterways such as rivers, lakes, canals, and coastlines for recreational use. According to the National Park Service, The National Water Trails System is a network of water trails open to the public to explore and enjoy. The trails have been established to restore and protect America's rivers, shorelines, and waterways, and to increase access to outdoor recreation on those shorelines and waterways. As the Committee continues to research this concept for our local area, more information will likely appear in future *Messenger* articles.



NEW TICK BORNE ILLNESS in Readfield

Be aware an individual in Readfield has been diagnosed with <u>Anaplasmosis</u>, a known tick borne infection.

Symptoms are described on the flyer (fever, shaking, chills, severe headache)
Treatment is similar to Lyme so contact your physician if you are
displaying symptoms.

Anaplasmosis

Fact Sheet






Anaplasmosis is an illness caused by the bacteria Anaplasma phagocytophilum. It is spread by the bite of an infected *lxodes* scapularis tick (also called the deer tick).




Anyone can get anaplasmosis, but people who spend time outdoors are at the highest risk.

Common Signs and Symptoms



More Severe Signs and Symptoms



Symptoms range from mild to severe. Very few people experience ALL of these symptoms.



Talk to your doctor if you have any of these signs or symptoms after being bit by a tick. Anaplasmosis is diagnosed based on signs and symptoms and confirmed through blood tests. It is treated with antibiotics.

Preventing Tick Bites



Wear light colored, longsleeved clothing. Tuck your pants into your socks.



Use an EPA approved bug spray.



Rake your leaves and keep your lawn mowed.



Do daily tick checks and check your pets too.

Safe Tick Removal



Use a tick spoon or fine-tipped tweezers to remove a tick.

- -Using tweezers, grab the tick by its mouth and use firm, steady pressure to pull the tick out. Do not use twisting motions.
- -Using a tick spoon, line the notch of the spoon up with the head of the tick and gently scoop.

Do not use nail polish, matches, or petroleum jelly to remove the tick. These methods increase the risk of localized skin infection.

Where are Deer Ticks Found in Maine?

Deer ticks, which can carry the bacteria that cause anaplasmosis, are found everywhere in Maine. Areas where deer ticks live include:

- -Wooded or forested areas
- -Wild, unmaintained landscapes with high grass
- -Brush or leaf piles

Ticks are active at any temperature above freezing.

Tai Chi for Health and Balance - This workshop is focused on practicing Tai Chi, which can help people improve balance and health as well as relieve pain.

An in-person Tai Chi for Health and Balance workshop is being offered by Healthy Living for ME network partner, Spectrum Generations at the Richmond Area Senior Center beginning July 11th. The workshops will be held on Mondays and Wednesdays, 9:00-10:00am and runs through September 19th. The cost for participants is \$45.

Savvy Caregiver - The Savvy Caregiver Program helps caregivers better understand the changes their loved ones are experiencing and how to best provide individualized care for their care recipients throughout the progression of Alzheimer's or dementia. There is no cost for participants.

Two sessions of this workshop are being offered by Healthy Living for ME network partner, Spectrum Generations. The first will be held online, beginning July 19th. It will be held on Tuesdays, 6:30-8:30am, through August 23rd.

The second will be held in-person at Center Point Church in Waterville, beginning July 21st. It will be held on Thursdays, 9:00-11:00am, through August 25th.


