IMPORTANT NOTICE ABOUT PROPERTY TAXES FOR BUYERS AND SELLERS

- 1. UNDER MAINE LAW PAYMENT OF PROPERTY TAXES IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PERSON WHO OWNS THE PROPERTY ON APRIL 1ST.
- 2. THE BUYER AND SELLER MAY AGREE TO DIVIDE THE TAXES BETWEEN THEM, BUT IF ANY PART OF THE TAXES IS NOT PAID, A LIEN WILL BE FILED IN THE NAME OF THE PERSON WHO OWNED THE PROPERTY ON APRIL 1ST.

PLEASE BE AWARE

IF YOU ARE THE SELLER -- EVEN IF YOU NO LONGER OWN THE PROPERTY, A LIEN MAY HAVE A NEGATIVE EFFECT ON YOUR CREDIT RATING.

IF YOU ARE THE BUYER -- IF A LIEN IS FILED IN THE SELLER'S NAME, THE MUNICIPALITY MAY FORECLOSE ON YOUR PROPERTY UNLESS THE TAXES ARE PAID.

- 3. MUNICIPALITIES HAVE DIFFERENT FISCAL YEARS AND TAX DUE DATES.
- 4. MAKE SURE YOU UNDERSTAND THE BUYER'S AND SELLER'S OBLIGATIONS WITH REGARD TO PROPERTY TAXES AND WHAT MAY HAPPEN IF TAXES ARE NOT PAID AS AGREED.
- 5. IF YOU FEEL A LIEN HAS BEEN FILED INCORRECTLY IN YOUR NAME;
 - A. OBTAIN A COPY OF THE LIEN FROM THE REGISTRY OF DEEDS; AND
 - B. DISCUSS THE MATTER WITH YOUR MUNICIPALITY.

IF YOUR CREDIT REPORT IS INCORRECT, CONTACT THE BUREAU OF CONSUMER CREDIT PROTECTION AT 1-800-DEBT-LAW TO DETERMINE WHAT REMEDIES ARE AVAILABLE TO YOU TO CORRECT YOUR CREDIT REPORT.




The original piece of art done by Joseph Cummings Chase is currently on display at RHS.

FOOD WASTE AND COMPOSTING

Did you know that almost a third of what we throw away is leftover or spoiled food? If Maine is to achieve a 50% recycling rate, we need to recover our food waste, too it's worth the weight!

We have food composting counter-top bins available for free at the Transfer Station and at your Town Office. There is a food bin at the compost pile and a sawdust covered pile there too for you to place your unneeded food in. There is even a bin there to dispose of a bag if you choose to carry it that way to the transfer station. We also have backyard composting bins available for free at the Transfer Station. Please see an attendant for any questions or items that you may need.

General Operation Practices

All vehicles must stop at the Attendant Booth to speak with an employee about what materials you are bringing in, to receive directions on where to dispose of these materials, and to pay any required fee.

Please leave when you are finished to avoid making the space congested.

Code Enforcement

Summer is almost gone and it has been a great one so far.. Some follow-ups from my previous letter..

Please make every attempt to make your House address visible to first responders and others like Fed Ex, Postal Delivery, and visitors. Readfield Fire Department had some emergency call delays due to confusion on private roads due to misunderstanding which road went in which direction due to poor road signage and with not having House numbers prominently displayed.

Readfield Ordinance states: All owners of numbered structures shall maintain in a conspicuous place, their assigned numbers in the following manner:

- a. Number on the Structure or Residence. Where the residence or structure is within 50 (fifty) feet of the edge of the road right-of-way, the assigned number shall be displayed on the front of the residence or structure near the front door or entry.
- **b.** Number at the Road Line. Where the residence or structure is over 50 (fifty) feet from the edge of the road right-of-way, the assigned number shall be displayed 42-48 inches above ground on a post, fence, or wall; on the mail box; or on some structure at the side of the roadway next to the walkway or access drive to the residence or structure.
- c. Size, Color, and Location of Numbers. The size of the numeral(s) shall, at a minimum, cover an area 2" (two inches) wide by 4" (four) inches high and must be light reflective and of a color that sufficiently contrasts with their background. Numbers shall be located to be visible from the road at all times of the year.

If you do not know your physical Address please call the Code Officer (me) at town hall. Every structure should have an E-911 road address that first responders utilize.

GIS and maps are good but in an emergency there is no substitute for proper directional Road Signs and House Number Display. THIS COULD SAVE YOUR AND YOUR FAMILY LIVES IN AN EMERGENCY !

As an additional motivation, this will also assist getting your Amazon and Fed/Ex/UPS deliveries arrive in the right place in a timely and correct process.

Announcing Winthrop Area Rotary Club 2022 Community Project

Are you worried about paying for your heating costs as the temperature starts to drop. The Winthrop Area Rotary Club has a great opportunity for you.

As a community service the Winthrop Area Rotary is sponsoring a Window Dressers Community Build this fall! This project offers homeowners and renters in Winthrop, Readfield, and Monmouth indoor window inserts at no cost to you! You can read about these window inserts and how they are made at <u>www.windowdressers.org</u>. Learn more and discuss how we can schedule an appointment with our trusted Rotary members to measure and order your window inserts: <u>winthropwindowinserts@gmail.com</u>

WindowDressers Insulating Window Inserts let in light while stopping drafts. Each insert is made of a custom-made pine frame wrapped on each side with tightly-sealed, clear polyolefin film, creating an airspace between the two layers for additional insulation. The insert is finished with a compressible foam gasket. The foam allows enough give for the inserts to be easily slid into place in the fall and removed in the spring, while holding firmly enough to provide a tight, friction-based seal. The inserts are installed inside of your existing window frame with no fasteners required.

The Winthrop Area Rotary will provide these inserts at no cost to participants. We rely on voluntary donations from those who are willing and able to help support this important community project this year and help ensure continuation in the future. Trained Rotary members will conduct the measuring visits and solicit participants to help in the construction or "build" of the frames based on

individual orders this November at the Winthrop Middle School.

With rising costs everywhere, do yourself a favor and at least check out our community support project. You are not likely to be disappointed.



NEWS & NOTES FROM THE TRAILS

With the "unofficial" end of summer approaching as The Messenger goes to press, the Trails Committee looks forward to the changes that occur in our lives as well as the activity on our trails: summer residents head home, schools start up, work schedules change, trees and bushes start their internal changes, and pollinating season seems to be slipping by until next spring. Speaking of pollinating, the milk weed at the Fairgrounds, which is a natural habitat for the endangered Monarch butterfly, had a very good summer even with the often drought- like conditions. RSU # 38 agreed to delay their annual mowing from late July to later in August to allow more opportunities for pollinating and bird activity on the upper fields on the school property. Trail users reported spotting Monarchs and other species in the fields off the parking lot and while walking the trails.

Trails Committee members were busy all summer with mowing, brush cutting, and weed whacking the trail edges to keep unwanted invasives from overgrowing the trails. With about two miles of trails, the volunteer work sometimes seems never ending. Trails member Steve Hayes does a great job everyday (rain or shine) doing litter patrol on the trails and parking lot. Thanks Steve!

Once again this year the Trails Committee and some town volunteers will be joined by students from our local schools to do trail maintenance. We are always looking for volunteers to join us on those days. The October Messenger will have the dates for the work.

Rocks. We all have our opinions on their worth and uses but the rocks (at least some of them) that surround the Fairgrounds parking lot have a history worth recounting. You may have noticed some of them are sporting numbers. Why? Read on. Several years ago when the original parking lot was created there, then resident Ellen Blanchard undertook a project for a Maine Master Naturalist course she was taking. She studied the geology of the large rocks, numbered them, and had a brochure printed giving all the details. The brochures have disappeared over the years but we have reached out to Ellen to see what she can add to the rock history of the Fairgrounds. When the lot was enlarged to accommodate the new ball field, more boulders were added and today there are +/ - 79 total (depending where you count from) that ring the lot. Take a stroll and report back as to the number of "numbered" large rocks you find.

As Rob Peale always mentions in his trails articles, we are always looking for volunteers for our committee. If you encounter anything that concerns you while using any of our trails, please bring it to our attention. Although it has not been an issue recently, we remind our pet owners to take care of anything their pet tries to leave behind! Enjoy our trails and bring on Fall, 2022.

Workshops Available to Help Mainers Manage Chronic Conditions and Improve Fitness

The Healthy Living for ME network is offering a number of free and low-cost workshops that begin in September. The workshops are being held in different regions throughout the state by network

partners and are open to adult Mainers of all ages. Additionally, the Better Health Now with Pain workshop is held by phone so it can be easily accessed by people anywhere in the state.

- Living Well for Better Health This workshop helps participants deal with ongoing conditions such as diabetes, COPD, arthritis, and high blood pressure. Topics covered include: handling frustration, fatigue, pain and isolation; appropriate exercise for maintaining and improving strength, flexibility, and endurance; appropriate use of medications; communicating effectively with family, friends, and health professionals; nutrition; and evaluating new treatments. Living Well for Better Health is being offered in-person in Fort Fairfield by Healthy Living for ME network partner, Aroostook Agency on Aging. The workshop begins on September 6, 2022. It will be held on Tuesdays, 10:00am-12:30pm, through October 11, 2022. There is no cost to participants.
- Better Health Now with Pain This workshop is designed for those who experience long-term pain; their friends, family, and/or caregivers are also welcome to join.
