### **Transfer Station News - October**

As daylight hours shorten, please continue to take extra care while at the Transfer Station in the afternoon hours. Be mindful of folks walking to the bins as well as being careful where you walking, especially when leaving compost, brush or appliances.

You may not know there are a number of companies utilized to remove everything disposed of at the Readfield Transfer Station as needed. Most of these vendors charge fees for their services. That's why customers need to pay for certain items brought in, including construction debris, furniture, mattresses, TV's, computers and refrigerators, to name a few.

Recently, the vendors have had to increase their fees to keep pace with operational costs such as fuel, labor and overall inflation. What this means to residents is that the costs to operate the Readfield Transfer Station have increased.

The current fee schedule has been in effect since 2016. Simply put, these fees no longer cover the vendor removal costs. As a result, a new fee schedule with increased prices will be implemented on January 1, 2023.

Residents of Fayette, Wayne and Readfield will not be individually charged for household trash, recycling, brush, metal, batteries or compost. Your taxes already pay for disposing of these items and will continue to do so.

#### Practice Kindness Please.

Please remember to be patient with everyone while you are at the Transfer Station. There are many challenges presented to using the space safely and efficiently and everyone handles those in their own way. But please try to be patient and understanding of other patrons and our employees. Everyone is doing the best they can and deserves to be treated respectfully and with kindness. Thank you for efforts to make this Town operated facility function well.

#### **General Operation Practices**

All vehicles must stop at the Attendant Booth to speak with an employee about what materials you are bringing in, to receive directions on where to dispose of these materials, and to pay any required fee.

Please leave when you are finished to avoid making the space congested.

#### Community Solar Purchase Option -

To all those that have inquired about purchasing discounted electricity from the new Solar Farm here in town,

I have spoken to individuals at Readfield Power LLC, Power Engineers Inc. (Sebago Technics) and Syncarpha Solar.

The answer is the Community Solar Purchase program proposed in the original application does exist but follow the details:

The power that will be produced at the Readfield Solar Farm will be sent to the "GRID" which will be facilitated by CMP.


That 4.95 MW power will be bought by CMP/ Syncarpha and will be offered by Syncarpha to Readfield Residents at an 15% discount to the CMP bill on any line item figured in kW usage, both supply and distribution charges kW related. This does not include non kW related items on the monthly CMP bill.

The resident will get two bills each month; one from CMP and one from Syncarpha.

The Syncarpha bill will require an autopay option of an authorized credit or debit card.

Syncarpha has a subunit that is supposed to be the sales and marketing of this credit "deal". The deal is first come first serve until the Readfield credits are sold out at which point the credits go to the CMP solar offering pool.

Many of you may find this an understandable bargain, but many residents may not. Some residents may not be able to or want to provide an auto pay credit card or debit card number for the Syncarpha bill. Also there may be individuals misunderstanding the requirement to pay two bills for electric each month. The Town of Readfield will not be the service agents for Syncarpha in the marketing, customer service or complaint department for the offering.

We follow the Federal Guidelines but will never turn anyone away.

#### **Maranacook Food Pantry**

Hello again from the MAFP. The pantry has had a busy summer and fall We continue to provide on average 18-20 boxes of food items each week including staples such as cereal, rice, potatoes etc. along with a meal's worth of fresh meat. Every other week we work with Farmer Kev from West Gardiner to include fresh vegetables. During the summer and early fall we also had weekly access to fresh eggs at low cost but that has ended. The Readfield Methodist Church continues to send boxes of donated food for the pantry via Readfield Town Office.

The grant we received from the Tabitha and Stephen King Foundation has kept us going in good stead but we are researching more grant monies. RSU #38 continues to handle all our finances so we can concentrate full time assisting folks who have food insecurity. The core of volunteers operating the pantry has not changed except Readfield resident Ralph Eno recently joined our Thursday distribution team. Supporters who wish to remain anonymous often drop off bags of food items at the pantry located at the Maranacook Middle School and this fall bags of locally grown apples have found their way to us! Soon the Kids Who Care program at the high and middle schools will hold their annual food drives and we so appreciate their help.

With the holiday season fast approaching (notice I did not mention the white stuff that comes with the season) we know requests for our services will increase. We have been fortunate in past years to have local businesses and organizations such as Manchester Lions and Highbrow on Route 202 help us put together Thanksgiving and Christmas meals for local families. Our numbers usually jump from 20 or so to 35-40 requests through the school's nurse's confidential contacts. The pantry's expenses, like yours too, have increased. For example a box of cereal a year ago that cost us \$1.77 now is up around \$2.79 and a generic box of crackers jumped from \$.92 to \$1.32 recently. I should note that every single penny of donated money to the pantry goes to purchasing the food and vegetables we provide.

Now comes the pitch, the angle, the come-on etc. This year we are reaching out to those in our community, both individuals and businesses, that could see their way to donate a turkey at Thanksgiving or Christmas to help the pantry and those who need support. The time frame for drop off at the Middle School is below. If these days and times do not mesh with your schedule, call or email Greg Durgin to arrange an alternative plan. Thank you for any help you can provide!

From the picnic table down to where the trail crosses the fairly large culvert, Maranacook advisors and their advisees spent the better part of almost 5 hours on October 6<sup>th</sup> hauling, spreading, and raking loads of blue stone as they put down a new coating over a well worn section of trail.

Readfield Trails Committee always asks for a group to come and work at the Fairgrounds. Trails member Greg Leimbach and resident Howard Lake arrived at the Fairgrounds a day or so in advance and used their tractors to move the product from the back of the cemetery to strategic locations to help facilitate the manual labor needed. The tools used for the day are donated by G&E Roofing of Augusta. The event is organized by the United Way and resident Robyn Graziano who is the staff coordinator. #### READFIELD TO HOLD SPECIAL VETERANS DAY EVENT

An event honoring all Veterans will be held in Readfield on Friday, Nov. 11<sup>th</sup> planned by members of Readfield's Historical Society, Select Board, United Methodist Church and the 3<sup>rd</sup> Maine Infantry Civil War re-enactors. All are welcome to join in for this special remembrance and honoring of those who have served or currently serve in the U.S. Armed Services.

Participants should gather at the Readfield Corner Cemetery, Church Road by 10 a.m. for a special remembrance of some Veterans whose memorials and graves are there. From the cemetery the 3<sup>rd</sup> Maine will lead the way to Asa Gile Hall, 8 Old Kents Hill Road, for a closing ceremony at 11 a.m. in honor of all Veterans. All are invited to march along or those who are not able to walk that far can follow in their vehicles. The Third Maine will do two musket volleys along the way, at the cemetery and outside Gile Hall.

Following the ceremony free bag lunches will be distributed at Gile Hall, by members of the Readfield United Methodist Church.



You can get help paying for your home energy bills and emergency home heating fuel delivery from the Home Energy Assistance

Program (HEAP).

#### Fuel assistance

HEAP is a program that can help pay part of your annual home heating costs. Your benefit amount is based on several factors, including your household size, income, and home energy costs.

#### **Emergency** assistance

More help may be available if you have less than a three (3) day supply of heating fuel. We may also be able to help if you cannot pay your bill and your services may be disconnected.

#### Am I eligible?

Anyone who may need help paying for their home heating costs should apply for the program. Please apply even if your application has been denied before. Apply even if your income may be over the income limits because some expenses may be deducted. Homeowners and renters may apply. You can also apply even if heat is included in your rent. Find more information at mainehousing.org/heap.

#### How do I apply?

You apply through your local Community Action Agency (CAA). You can apply in person or over the phone. Ask your CAA what documentation you need to have when you apply. Find out more information at mainehousing.org/heap.

#### What to expect

Appointments fill up fast and it may take a while to get an appointment. It usually takes several weeks to process a HEAP application. If your HEAP application is denied, you can reapply if your circumstances change.

#### Other help available


If you are approved for HEAP, you may be able to get help with your electric bills through your electricity utility company's Low Income Assistance Plan (LIAP).



- REAPFIELD BEACH. This 87-acre recreation area on Maranacook. Lake was acquired in 1988 by the town. Previously, it was run by a private association for 20 years, it offers a buoyed swim area with float, princi facilities, cilotybe loots, and opportunities for firming altherings. Skating is popular without. The adjoining wetlands provide superlative habitat for aquatic wellife. Passes available to residents for an annual east the Town Office. Directions: From Readfield Conters, go 0.6 mile east on Main Street (Roude 17). The beach parking lot is on the right.
- 2. READFIELD FAIRGROUNDS. From 1856 to 1932, Readfield Fairgounds was home to one of Manie's most pressignous agricultural fairs. In 1933, the Town purchased 36 acres to create a recreation and conservation area near the village center. The area has a network of graveled trails for warking, natura study, and consectivity skiing that connect with trails on the Maranacook School Property and the village sidewalk. A ballifield is located near the Church Rd. Directions: From Readfield Corner, go 0.3 mile north on Church Road. Parking area on right.
- 3. FOGG FARM CONSERVATION AREA. This 15-acre gem was part of the Pogg Farm for nearly woo centuries, in the early 1900s, after the farm was subdivided it was donated to Readfield with a conservation easement to the Kennebec Land Trust. An easy loop trail whost through mixed forest uplands for O. Amie and a second loop adds an additional 2. mile. Trail and bridge work was done by Maranacook Community School Pathways students and the Readfield Conservation Commission. Directions: From Readfield Conservation Commission. Uurn right (east) onto Fogg Road and go 0.6 mile. There is a green sign at the trailbead and parking along the left shoulder of the road.
- 4. TORSEY POND NATURE PRESERVE. In 2001, Readfield purchased 92 acress along Torsey Pond for open space and recreation with funds from the Maine Land & Water Conservation Fund, a town appropriation, and local confubulons. A conservation essement was accepted by the Kennebec Lend Tust in 2003 to assure permanent protection. The preserve is one of the richest biological areas in Readfield with mixed forest uplands, a mile of shoreline, and very significant wading bird and waterfowl habitat. There are two miles of watering the mile north on Chimney Road (Route 41) to the TPNP parking lot on the right. Use the public boat launch on Old Kents Hill Road at the south end of Torsey Pond for water access.
  - 6. READFIELD TOWN FARM & FOREST. This 110-acre tract of woodland is the site of the former town fam for the needy. Today the area offers hiding, cross-country skiing, and nature study on 2.3 miles of trails which connect with trails on the adjacent KLT Macdonald Conservation Area property. The property is also namaged for willille and sustainable forestry. Directions: From Route 133 in Winthrop, turn north onto North Vayne Road. Go 1.3 miles and turn right onto Hathaway Road. Go 0.7 mile and turn left onto Batz Road. Just before the gate at the end, park with care on the left side of the road. Do not block the otherway of rumanoum. Proceed on foot past the gate about 0.3 mile north on the old Town Farm Road. The property is also accessible from Macdonald Conservation Area (see description below).
    - MILL STREAM DAM. In the mid-19th century, Factory Square was a major industrial area in Radelfed where many manufacturing businesses were clustered. The site now features a footbridge across Mill Stream and the remains of a stone dam, spillway, and foundations. Trails allow access to the floot of the dam, the stream and an everlook. Interpretative plaques recall Readfield's industrial past. Directions: Walk the short distance from Gales Road along Mill Stream Road to this significant historic and scene spot or access from trail from Old Kents Hill Rd, just a short ways north from the Town Office.
- 7. MARANACOK COMMUNITY SCHOOL. The MCS campus includes 320 acres. Trails around the mindle and high scholes offer heiring, cross-country sking, and nature study. A graveled trail leading from the Superintendent's Offree connects with the Edippriounts trails system. The Initiate visible from the access road provides great family sledding. Terms courts, builleds, and an outdoor track are also available when not in use by the achools. Directions: From Readfield Corner, go 0.7 mile east on Main Street (Route 17), turn left onto Millard Harrison Drive. Trailhead at Superintender's Office on Helt. School parking lots at end of road available during non-school hours.

- 8. WYMAN MEMORIAL, FOREST. This 40-acre woodnand was donated to the Kennebbe Land Triat in 1939 by the heirs of Vivalier and Alice to the Myman. After a red pline plantation on the property was affected by the ince storm of 1998, the land trust conducted as ranial logging operation to accelerate restoration to more natural conditions. The rest of the preserve is covered with matter, mixed-growth Total typical of recovering farmland Traits ascend Monks Hill from Main Street and from Shedd Pond. Directions: From Main St. (Route 17), go 1.25 miles north on Gordon Rd. Turn right and go 0.9 mile on Scribner-Hill Rd. There is a sign at the trailbead and parking along the right shoulder of the road.
- 9. GANNETT WOODS. Shedd Pond is important habitat for ducks, beseves, and other wildline in 2004, John and Pal Samnet domated 120 arcs to the Kormebec Land Trust to ensure the strontine of the pond would remain free of development. Snowmobiles are allowed on a maintained rail. No other of froat wholes or overnight camping, A trail on the west side of the pond cornects to the Wyman Memorial Forest. Directions: Follow directions to the Allen-Whitney Memorial Forest.
- 10. ECHO LAKE WATERSHED PRESERVE. This 200-acre parcel in the Echo Lake watershed was perchased in 2004 and 2008 with funds raised by the Echo Lake Association and Kenneboc Land Trust. The property will remain undeveloped to help protect the water quality of Echo Luke and to provide for widitie habilati. A plant nature trail leads to an open log. Directions: From Kenis Hill, go approximately 1 mile north on Chimney Road (Roled 41), Les the parking for on the right at the Torsey Pond Nature Preserve. A plaque marks the Echo Lake Watershed Preserve across the road where the bog trail begins.
- 11. MACDONALD CONSERVATION AREA. The 100-acre Macdonald Conservation Acae was domated to the Kennebec Land Trust by Douglas and Jessie Macdonald in 2003 to preserve widitie habitat and open space for recession. The former Readiled Town Farm (on the south), the Hunton Cemetery (on the north), the Saddon Smith Homestead foundston (on the east), and the site of the former District 6 Schoolbouse (on the northeast), are noteworthy cornections to Readiled's history, A.2.5-mile trail connects to the Readiled's history, A.2.5-mile trail connects to the Readiled's Inflie and turn fight onto Lane Road. Go 0.5 mile to the end and turn left onto North Wayne Road (most Road Foad in Vayno). Go 1.3 miles to the end and turn left onto North and turn left onto Kents Hill Road. Go 0.2 mile and pank on the left at the KLT sign. Do not block the road or driveways.
  - 12. ROSMARIN AND SAUNDERS FAMILY FOREST. This property was donated to the Kennebec Land Trust KLT in 2016 by the Rosmain family. It had been owned by the Saunders Manufacturing Co. Historically the property was farmed and pastured, though more recently it has been managed as a woodlot. The 342-acre property is an extensive conservation area with mixed woodlands, two peternial streams, a large beaver bog and four vental pools. The one mile (+) Beaver Pord Loop tital begins at the parking area on the vickerson Hill Road, follows the eastern side of the Beaver Pord Loop tital begins at the parking area on the vickerson Hill Road. Travel for 0.6 miles to a small parking area on held.
- 13. TYLER CONSERVATION AREA. A 45-acre easement, donated by the Upy fer family, protects wildfier habitat, provides for flora recreation, and conserves the rural character of this Readfield neighborhood. A winter trail from Maranacook High School to Torsey Pond is used by snowmobilers. Directions: From Readfield Corners, go 12. mile wast on Main Street (Route 17). Turn right onto Old Kents Hill Road, then right at 0.6 mile onto Thundercaste Road. A small parking area is located on the right side of the road at about 0.7 mile. Look for the Tyter Conservation Area trailhead sign.
- 14. KENTS HILL SCHOOL. Luther Sampson, a Revolutionary Warr vertern, and Elim Robinson, founder of a local apprenticuship school, started the Maine Wesleyan Seminary in 1824 in a small building on Kents Hill. Later renamed, the school has educated generations of young men and women from all over the wond Kents Hill School also shares its facilities with the local community. Trails throughout the woods offer opportunities for heiking, montain-bilding, cross-country sking and showshoeing, and nature study. Please respect the school activity schedule. Directions: From Main Street (Route 7), Lun left at the sign for the Alton Athelics, Center Park swey from the Lotaling. Trails run through the woods along the ridge and down to Lovejloy Pond.

- 15. LUCE MEMORIAL FOREST. This 78-acre property was conveyed to the New England Foresty Foundation (NEEF) in 1990 by James M. Smith and Julie H.M. Smith Sohmssen. These configuous parcels have been under professional management by NEFF since 1951. There are no marked trails but the area is 6 open for hising. hunting, and other non-molocitzed recreation during day-lame hours. Directions: From Readfield Corner, 90 west on Main St. (Route P.) 0.5 mile. Turn left onto Sturkevant Hill Rd. and go 2.2 miles. Turn right onto Huntoon Lane and go 0.3 mile. Park on the right at the sign for the Luce Memorial Forest.
- 16. ALLEN-WHITNEY MEMORIAL FOREST. Though located in Marchester, this 70%-acre managed woodband connects to important open space lands in Readfield. The property was settled during colonial times by the Alien family, which was active in publishing and real restate in Augusta. Edward A. Vihitney deceded the first parcel of this forest to the New England Forestry Foundation in 1955. A woods road system provides access for forest management as well as helping, hurting, fishing, and nature study. Snowmobiles are allowed on maintained trails. No other off-road vehicles or camping are permitted. Directions: From Man Stellet (Roule 17), go 1.25 miles north on Gordon Road. Turn right and go 2.5 miles on Scribner Hill Road. At the crest of a hill, park on the right at the sign for the Allen-Whitney Memorial Forest.

- 18. PARKS LOT. This small, forested parcel provides important wetland and widtle helbatt. It was given in 2016 to the Town of Readled in memory of Guy Parks, it. by his heirs. Directions: From Readled Corner, go 0.1 mile east on Main Street (Route 17). The lot is on the left.
- 19. READFIELD CORNER WATER ASSOCIATION. This property is managed to protect the source of vell wither for a number of businesses and homes at Readfield Corner. It also provides 17.5 acres of important wildlife habitat and a connection to the Readfield Fairgrounds. It is available for quiet day use recreation. Directions: From Readfield Corner, go 0.3 mile north on Church Road. Park at the Readfield Fairgrounds across the road.
- 20. AVERY-SMITH SHORE LAND. Dr. Mary Ellen Avery and her family donated this beautiful 7-acre parcel on Echo Lake to the Kennebec Land Trust in 1991. It is a woodland wonderland with cedar, pine, birch, and wildflowers along 1,200 feet of unspoiled shoreline. The property does not have traits and is best viewed from the water. Directions: The closest water access is the boat launch in West Mount Vernon at the northeast end of Echo Lake.
- 21. WESTMAN WOODS. Ilse Westman wanted these 26 acres speeved as widtle habitat, so she donated this area to the Kenrebec Land Trust in 2005. The upper part is early successional habitat mostly hardwoods. The lower portion has an older confer confer confer marked trails. Directions: From Main Street (Route 17), go 0.9 mile on South Road. Park with care along the side of the road.
- 22. ST. ANDRE FIELDS. In 1995, John and Bappe SI. Andre donated a conservation easement to the Kennebec Land Trust to maintain the scenic beauty of these fedds. There are no trails, but the fields are open for nature observation except during the late spring and summer when the hay crop is growing. The easement covers the fields on the north and south sides of Quarry Drive. Directions: From Main Street (Route 17), go 0.9 mile on South Road. Turn left and park along the southeastern edge of Quarry Drive. Do not to block the road.
- 23. TORSEY POND OUTLET CONSERVATION AREA. This easement was donated to the Kennebec Land Trust in 2005 to preserve water quality and widdlie habital. It protects 12.5 acres and over 1200 feet of valuable shoreland on the west side of Torsey Pond near the outlet. Public access is by permission only.

- 24. CARLETON POND. In the early 1900s, the Augusta Water District acquired more than 700 acres (568 acres in Readfield) around Carleton Pornal for watershed protection. The Maine Legislature designated the area a game preserve in 1931. An additional 40 acres were donated in 1996 to the Water District with a permanent conservation easement granted to the Kernebec Land Trust. Today, this area includes a diversity of wildlife habitals. White-tailed deer, beavers, foxes, turkeys, and a wide variety of britis, amphidisms, and replies call the area home. A snowmobile trail runs through the property. Other public access is by permission only though other trails may be developed in the future.
- 25. LAKESIDE ORCHARDS. Jacob Pope planted the first apple trees there in the 1870s. The farm now encompasses 189 acres with thousands of apple trees. In 1899, the Maine Department of Agriculture acquired a conservation easement on Lakeside Orchards with funding from the stake Land for Maines Estutue and Seleral Farmland Protection programs. Lakeside Orchards operates a retail store on Route 17 in Manchester. Public access is by permission only.
- 26. KENTS HILL ORCHARD. This 91.6-acre property was purchased Wheire Faminad Trust in 2010 and subsequently adolt to Belle Vue Fam. LLC in 2011 subject to a conservation essement. Much of the historic orchard has been removed and replaced by commercial com and vegetable fields. Public access is by permission only except for a snowmobile trail.
- 27. OLD FAIRGROUNDS FIELD. Originally part of the historic Readfield regrounds, this 15-ace patient is owned in common by the members of the Old Fairgrounds Landowners Association and protected as open space by deed restrictions. Public access is by permission only.

## Water Access Sites

- 28. MARANACOOK LAKE. The Maine Department of Conservation mandains an access sile what a ramp to launch boats, plus parking for vehicles and trailers and a grassy area for picnicking. The Town of Readfield owns the welland south of the launch. Directions: From Readfield Corner, go 0.6 mile south on Winthrop Road (Route 41) to the boat launch on the left.
- 29. TORSEY POND. At the south end of Torsey Pond the Maine Department of Conservation has a hand-carry sile providing access for cannes, kayaks, and small boats. This shallow lake is popular for warm water fishing as well as widilfe watching in the marsh near the Torsey Pond Nature Preserve. Across the road is the site of an historic dam and mill works. No ramp or float. Minimal parking. Directions: From Readfield Corner, go 0.2 mile west on Main Street (Route 17). Turn right and go 0.8 mile on Old Kents Hill Road to the boat learnch on the right.
- 41 in West Mount Carleton, Lovejoy. NOTE: There is public access to Echo Lake on Route « Vernon. There are no public launch sites on Brainard, C or Mill Ponds. There is walking access to Shedd Pond.

Hunting blinds, treestands and other hunting-related structures are permitted for deer hunting on the Readfield Town Forest during the regular firearms season as well as for archery/crossbow and muzzle-loading seasons provided that any such structure:

- Shall not be permanently attached to the ground or a tree and shall not be attached to a tree in a manner that damages the tree;
- 2. Shall be located greater than 300 feet from a trail and the cleared historic farmstead area;
- Shall be registered with the Town prior to placement and labelled with the identification of the owner and contact information;
- 4. Shall not be placed more than seven days prior to the start of the relevant hunting season and shall be removed within three days after the close of the season;
- Shall be free from litter at all times and the site shall be left clean and undisturbed; and
- 6. Shall otherwise comply with Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife rules and regulations.
