The Select Board is committed to bringing the revised Fairgrounds Park to fruition and we hope you can join us in creating a long lasting, outdoor recreation area where it should be - in the heart of our wonderful town.

Stay tuned here to follow the developments and watch as we work together to bring this opportunity to Readfield.



NOTES AND EXPLANATIONS

Minimum Fees and Why We Charge for Some Items:

There is a minimum \$3 fee for any and all demolition debris, bulky waste, and other special waste. The fees associated with these items marginally cover the cost of disposal and are in place to ensure personal accountability for special waste disposal and that these items are not paid for by other taxpayers.

Fee Schedule Establishment and Changes:

The current Fee Schedule is effective 1/1/2023. All fees and conditions are subject to changes adopted by the Readfield Select Board upon recommendation of the Solid Waste and Recycling Committee, in accordance with Ordinances and Interlocal Agreements adopted by voters.

Payment Methods (Cash or):

Electronic Payment - The Transfer Station accepts electronic payments but transaction fees are paid by the cardholder. Checks - The Transfer Station accepts checks for less than \$250 at the discretion of the Transfer Station staff. Receipts - A receipt will be issued for all fees collected.

Transfer Station Conduct:

See an Attendant before dropping any waste or if you have any questions about how or where to dispose of items. Everyone at the Transfer Station must be respectful to staff and other users and follow all rules of the facility. Inappropriate behavior may result in temporary or permanent restriction of access. Transfer Station staff will make decisions to accept or reject materials, to assess disposal charges, and to verify payment of appropriate fees. Disagreements over these matters may be brought to the Transfer Station Manager or Town Manager.

CIRCA SIGNS CONTINUE TO BE POPULAR

We placed the first order for house circa signs in 2015 having sold twenty that year. Every year since then we've received more requests and now place orders in the spring and fall (in time for holiday gifts). This fall eight more were delivered, including some in Winthrop, Sidney and Belgrade, those three being special requests by some RHS members. The ages of these latest houses cover a time span of 251 years. Each sign is accompanied with the research done on the families who once lived there in addition to the deeds of transfer. The oldest one researched in Readfield *this time* was built in 1797 and the newest in 2020. With newer homes the land is researched plus if a house had once existed there we include information about those and the families who lived there. Several have been sold under those conditions.

We have been asked by some other historical societies to do presentations on how we research and create these signs, which Dale Potter-Clark and Bill Adams did for the Wayne Historical Society this year. Winthrop Historical Society has expressed interest in an all day workshop by Dale and Bill in 2023.

The next circa sign order will be placed in the spring of 2023 when a minimum of six orders has been acquired. Cost is \$85 each which includes our research notes and photos (when available). 
The RHS annual meeting and program will be held on Saturday, March 18, 2023, 1:00 p.m. at Gile Hall. Details will be announced soon.

Week 1 - New Year's Resolution: Avoid Crypto Scams

Here's a New Year's Resolution we could all benefit from: be vigilant about cryptocurrency scams. Fraud involving crypto investment schemes and crypto as payment in other schemes skyrocketed in 2022, according to the Federal Trade Commission. Reported losses exceeded \$1 billion.

Last year, the evergreen online romance scam turned into crypto "investment opportunities" – starting on such platforms as Facebook, Instagram, and LinkedIn in addition to dating sites and apps. The target can see their assets gaining value as they continue to invest more money, only the crypto exchange they are on is fake. When they try cashing out, they're told they must first pay excessive fees, and they don't get their money back.

In the 'crypto as payment' schemes, criminals convince targets that some urgent matter requires quick payment and direct them to a nearby crypto-ATM machine that converts cash into electronic currency. These losses are virtually unrecoverable. The best way to avoid these scams – really any scam – is to know about them so you can avoid engaging from the start. Seek a financial advisor's guidance on investing, and anyone pressuring you to pay by crypto to address and urgent or time-sensitive matter is a criminal.

Week 2 – Credit Repair Scams

If you're like a lot of Americans, you spent a lot this holiday season and you might be in the mood to tackle your debt in the New Year. Getting yourself out of debt is hard work and it is time intensive. Be wary of offers of guaranteed quick fixes.

Criminal scammers prey on financial fears by offering simple solutions. These offers usually involve up-front fees (which are illegal), bad advice like stopping communication with your creditors and vague details on what services they provide. If you need help getting out of debt, turn to an organization like the nonprofit <u>National Foundation for Credit Counseling</u>.

Week 3 – When a Favor is Really a Scam

We all want to be helpful, especially when the request comes from our boss, a friend or a community leader. This instinct is something criminals take advantage of. That's why you should be suspicious of any urgent message that asks you to "do me a favor."

These scams can impersonate a boss needing last-minute gift cards for an employee appreciation event, or a local faith leader who needs a quick favor of you to buy gift cards to support a family in need. These quick gift card requests promise reimbursement, which never comes.

Be aware of short, urgent text messages, emails or social media messages asking for your help purchasing gift cards. Criminals can hack into the profiles of friends, family, and community members to send messages in their name. In the professional space, the message often looks like it's from your employer, but the criminal may have added a letter or number to the sender information.

Like so many scams, this one relies on getting the target into a heightened emotional state – of course you want to respond to your boss quickly or help your faith community support those in need. If you ever get a message asking for your help buying gift cards, contact the sender in a way you know to be legitimate and verify. Chances are the request was from a criminal

scammer.

Week 4 – Utility Bill Scams

Winter is upon us and with temperatures plummeting in many areas, keeping the heat on is critical — a fact that criminals try to take advantage of. They impersonate utility companies, threatening to cut off service if an immediate payment isn't made. The goal of these crooks is to create a sense of urgency so the target acts quickly to pay the alleged past-due balance.

If you get a surprise visit or call from the "utility company" this winter, hang up and don't engage. Contact your utility company in a way you know to be legitimate (online account, app, or customer service number from a prior bill) to determine if there is a problem with your account. And know that no legitimate company will seek immediate payment for a new-to-you issue.

Be a fraud fighter! If you can <u>spot</u> a scam, you can <u>stop</u> a scam.

Merry Christmas and Happy Hannukah! Now that the holidays have past we can settle in for a happy and healthy new year filled with all the outdoor fun that Readfield has to offer. Seems it is taking longer this year for Maranacook Lake to freeze over and the real trail riding to begin. So many of our trails are connected using the lake for access. I have a tendency to be quite impatient, but in truth I know that, in due time,

the lake will freeze. It always does! Meanwhile we wait for ice fishing and lots of snow, light powdery stuff that grooms well. The two late December storms were not the best for snowmobiling. 
