News from the Town Manager

Town Manager's Report - Budget Process and Draft Budget Update II

We are seeing lingering impacts from the pandemic including inflation and adjusting to two years of unsustainably high revenues. As a result we are faced with increasing costs to maintain the modest services currently provided by the Town relative to one or two years ago. We do have a few things going in our favor. Nearly a decade of stable and responsible governance, which continues with this year's budget has put the Town of Readfield in a position to minimize impacts to taxpayers. We anticipate a net increase in taxes, likely driven by anticipated County and Regional School Unit #38 budget increases, not by municipal spending. The Town does not set these budgets but does estimate their impacts as part of our budget process. All together, the total projected increase in tax impact is about 5.4% from levels in 2020, or about 1.5% annually - this is far less than inflation. Here are a few summary budget highlights from the PROPOSED municipal budget (not the RSU or County budgets):

- Many operating expenses are budgeted to rise as a result of increased material, transportation, and energy costs. Some expenses are being reduced because of savings or efficiency.
- In the State of Maine inflation stood at 8.7% in 2022. This resulted in an 8.7% increase in the State Minimum Wage. Wages in Readfield are subsequently proposed to increase by 8%. Salary and contract employees have a proposed 5% increase. Stipends for Firefighters and other volunteers, which have not seen an adjustment for several years, are proposed to rise 10%.
- We are able to budget for expenditures for several planned capital expenditures, including a new Fire Truck, paving projects, and the proposed Church Rd. Sidewalk, with minimal impact due to savings and responsible borrowing. The Fire truck was originally set to be replaced in 2018 but was "stretched" an additional 5 years. The proposed bond is estimated at 5% for 10 years.
- Several non-tax revenue streams are up as a result of consumer spending on things like home improvements relative to pandemic era levels. Other revenue sources are down as we consider the impacts of inflation and persistent supply chain issues. As stated earlier, intergovernmental revenues are less than what we have seen recently due to the end of COVID grants and subsidies.
- Bond proceeds are a major budgeted revenue to cover the new proposed Fire Truck.
- Assigned and unassigned municipal fund balances are being used to minimize tax impacts. We have developed healthy reserves for use in times like these but this too is temporary revenue.

Here are the key details on the budget and warrant process:

- Public Hearing on the budget and warrant will be on March 22nd and May 31st at 6:30pm. They will be held via ZOOM and at the Town Office.
- Candidate's Night will be held on **May 1**st at 6:30pm via ZOOM and at the Town Office.

Early Spring Weather Town Roads Posted

During the spring local roads weaken and they need to be protected. As temperatures warm and the ground thaws, soil under pavement and gravel becomes saturated with water, making the surface unstable. As a result many roads cannot support heavy loads. This spring is arriving early, and bringing road condition issues with it.

To protect our roads from serious damage - and subsequent repair costs that have to be paid for by taxpayers, the Town of Readfield has posted heavy load limits on vehicles over 23,000 pounds through April 15 unless removed earlier. Our roads are posted in accordance with Title 29-A MRSA 2395.

Here are a few tips to help navigate posted roads:

- Weight restrictions do not apply to certain materials like heating oil and propane, animal feed, and other necessities.
- Weight restrictions do not apply if the road is solidly frozen this means that during a significant portion of the posting period heavy loads are able to travel in the early morning with just a little advanced planning.
- If you are ordering appliances from any box store be sure to let them know at the time of purchase that your local roads are posted and they will need to use a smaller delivery vehicle.

The Town does sometimes allow for exemptions under extraordinary circumstances. This will require permission from our Road Commissioner or Deputy Road Commissioner. The Road Commissioner can be reached by calling 685-4939 or 931-7680 or by email. An exemption certificate will be issued to anyone with permission and must be kept in the vehicle during travel.

• If someone is caught traveling on a posted road (in a vehicle weighing more than 23,000 pounds) without permission they may be issued a fine and may be subject to possible restitution to the Town for damages to the road. To report weight limit violations, contact the Town Office or Road Commissioner.

Thank you in advance for helping to protect our roads, maintain road access, and save tax dollars on unnecessary road repairs!



Unfortunately, it looks like Spring has come forth very early this year. The 2022-2023 snowmobiling season was almost non-existent in the immediate Readfield area. With unseasonably warm temperatures, rain, no snow and a slushy lake, it's been a very disappointing season for snowmobilers almost everywhere in Maine. Snowmobile clubs, including Readfield Blizzard Busters, have completed all the work preparing and keeping the trails up to par, with little opportunity for everyone to enjoy them. You might remember volunteers replacing several bridges due to early extreme





flooding and washouts. It became impossible to eliminate water holes. There were many tree limbs and trees removed from the trail providing clear access. Most of our many bridges are in great shape and ready for the next season. The good news is the Club members are diehard Mainers who leave the 2022-2023 season with our eyes not on the past season, but on next year with hopes of lots of snow and cold temperatures. The town has put up its usual weight restrictions on certain roads, a clear sign that Spring and a vibrant mud season is here. Not my favorite Maine season, by the way. Keep in mind we could be blessed with a late season snowfall, which would be welcomed only if it comes with low temperatures. Looking forward to seeing what future winters bring to the sports-minded individuals of Readfield.

The Readfield Union Meeting House Board of Directors wants to announce that a Letter of Intent has been signed with Preservation Timber Framing, Inc of Berwick, ME. The document formalizes the long awaited structural restoration of the bell tower and belfry to take place in 2024. This letter secures our spot in their work schedule. The preliminary project total is just under \$600,000. Once final details are agreed upon a contract agreement will be signed.

- Think Green Before You Shop. Reduce associated greenhouse gas emissions by thinking green when you shop.
- Reduce your food waste by shopping smart, buying what you need, composting food scraps, and donating

- Reuse or repurpose items such as old clothing, cloth grocery bags, and containers to prevent waste.
- Buy used items to reduce waste as well as the emissions created by producing new materials or disposing of them in landfills. <u>Donate</u> unused clothing, electronics and building materials to make sure others can reuse them too!
- Buy products made with recycled content. Check labels to see if a product or its packaging is made from recycled materials.
- Know before you throw. Know what items your local recycling program collects and encourage your household to recycle right and recycle more.
- Learn about what else you can do at home, at school, at work and in your community!
- Maintain and repair products, like clothing, tires and appliances, so that they won't have to be thrown out
 and replaced as frequently.
- Borrow, rent or share items that are used infrequently, like party decorations, tools or furniture.

News & Notes from the Readfield Trails Committee

Ah, March has arrived just ahead of the "cruelest month of all" as the poet T.S. Elliott nicknamed April. Guess we will wait and see. February certainly had its moments: sleet, frozen rain, ice, some snow, record warm temperatures, thaws, refreezing etc. During the aforementioned weather events, our trails continued to see activity. Alongside the deer trails were snowshoe tracks, dog paw prints, boot prints, and ski pole holes. Weather hold Readfield residents and neighbors back from time on the trails? Does not appear so.

Last year at about this time a resident called me to report a huge snow / ice sinkhole located just below the backstop area at the Fairgrounds. That section was closed off with tape and orange cones to maintain safety. Trails member Steve Hayes worked to unclog the frozen drainage area. The trail was rerouted through the woods until the clog became "flowable" once again. During the summer Trails Committee members worked on that area with the intention of not having a repeat event. So far, so good.

A few months ago in this space, I wrote about the rocks surrounding the Fairgrounds parking lot and promised more information on the numbers that appear on some of them. Ellen Blanchard, a former resident, created a project related to the sedimentary, metamorphic, and igneous rocks that had been deposited thousands of years ago in a nearby gravel pit by the retreating Laurentide Glacier. They were excavated in 2014 to edge the Fairgrounds parking lot. There were 49 rocks with each one numbered on the lower right side facing the kiosk. The parking lot has since been expanded so the order of the rocks has been altered. Rocks added during the expansion are not numbered. Informational pamphlets that include pictures and information about each type of rock are available at the town office on the table in the foyer as well as at the Fairgrounds kiosk. A thank you and acknowledgments go out to several folks who helped out with the project and my research: Ellen Blanchard, Bob Marvinney, retired State Geologist, identified the rocks and provided editing help, Cheryl Ring for her photographs, and Melanie Lanctot for locating some "lost" pamphlets. After the snow melts, a contest will appear in the Messenger regarding the rocks at the parking lot. Yes, there will be a prize offered!

As the Messenger goes to press, a winter storm warning has been issued for Central Maine that could deposit 6-10 inches of snow. Appears winter has recovered its breath during February and is ready for action. Get out and enjoy the white stuff.


The Readfield Community Library is thrilled to be able to offer a 2023

AUTHOR EVENT WITH CLAIRE ACKROYD: the Maine Maple Industry and Murder in the Maple Woods





There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

BE WARM AND SAFE THIS WINTER!

- Keep anything that can burn at least three-feet (one metre) away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot (one metre) "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.




