

It is June, summer is on our doorstep, and things are heating up.... and not just outside!

June is voting season, and there's plenty to vote on for Readfield's upcoming election on June 13th at Kent's Hill School's Alfond Sports Complex, where we have voted for the last three years.

It's called Town Meeting and we do it by secret ballot, meaning, you get your ballot, sit down, examine your choices, and take as long as you need to make your selections. Afterwards, you get your sticker and proudly display that you participated in our most treasured of civic duties.

On June 13th, you'll have a chance to vote on leaders of our town and schools. You'll decide about providing the Fire Department with updated equipment. #### Town Manager's Report - Budget Update V - Proposed Budget Highlights

The long-standing budgetary goal for the Select Board, Budget Committee, Town Staff, and Volunteers is to provide the services our residents want, at the level of service they expect, as cost effectively as possible. The 2024 Municipal Budget meets that goal with net tax impacts increasing less than inflation.

Over the years the net impact of providing Municipal services has fluctuated. Municipal Services cost taxpayers between \$800,000 and \$1,000,000 each year and have been fairly stable over the past decade, with a "COVID Dip" from 2020 to 2022. Costs have increased in recent years and we have been careful to gradually adjust back to 2020 levels. We expect gradual increases over the next few years bringing us closer to 2018-2019 levels. Municipal services account for about 17% of what residents pay in property taxes, with the County adding about 7% and the RSU coming in around 76%.

We expect a 4% increase in the cost of Municipal Services this year. For the average taxpayer that means you'll likely pay about \$633, or about \$24 more than last year. The tables below show what Municipal Services have cost in recent years and what the cost looks like this year depending on property value. The current average assessed value for a residential property in 2023 is about \$260,000.

#### RULES OF THE READFIELD TOWN BEACH

As established by the Town Beach Ordinance, the purpose of these Beach Rules is to provide for the enjoyment, health, welfare and safety of all persons using the Town Beach; to provide a family-oriented atmosphere for lawful users of the Town Beach; to support the maintenance and operation of the Town Beach; and to maintain accepted environmental standards to preserve the ecological quality of the Town Beach and waterways for future generations.

- All users of the Town Beach are required to have a season pass or purchase a guest pass.
- All users of the Town Beach assume all risk. There is **NO LIFEGUARD** at any time.
- Town Beach Hours: 5:00 am 9:00 pm. No after-hours activity is allowed.
- All users of the Town Beach must follow the direction of Beach Staff. Beach Staff have the right to stop any behavior which they feel is disruptive, dangerous, or damaging.
- Children under 15 must be supervised by an adult remaining on the property at all times.
- When arriving at the Town Beach you must drive slowly and use caution in parking area, show your pass to Beach Staff on duty (or purchase guest pass from attendant), and keep your pass visible on the dashboard at all times.
- No bicycles are allowed outside of the parking areas.
- Possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages or drugs is prohibited.
- No glass of any kind is allowed at the Town Beach.
- No domestic animals are allowed at the Town Beach. Documented Service Animals by written permission of the Town Manager.
- No fishing allowed within 100 feet of the beach or buoyed swim area.
- No swimming beyond the buoys and no rough play anywhere.
- The use of any floats in the swim area will be limited by the discretion of the Beach Staff on duty.
- Swimming diapers are required for all children wearing diapers. Soiled swimsuits or diapers may not be rinsed out in the lake.
- No bathing with shampoo, soap, or other compounds.
- Trash and recycling cans are available at the Town Beach but we encourage a "carry-in, carry-out" policy to reduce the risk of attracting nuisance pests like wasps, rats, and skunks.
- There is absolutely no smoking, vaping, or tobacco use allowed anywhere on the property.
- All holes dug in the sand must be filled in when play is finished.
- No inappropriate language of any kind will be allowed.
- All noise must be kept to a level as to not to disturb others using the beach.
- All grill fires need to be doused with water before leaving. No fires outside of the grills.
- Sun umbrellas and shade canopies are allowed, no enclosed tents.
- No camping without written approval of the Select Board.
- Pass holders wishing to have any group function should call the Readfield Town Office at 207-685-4939 in advance to arrange fees and schedule times.
- Non-recreational use of the Town Beach is prohibited outside of designated non-recreational use areas.
- The Town of Readfield and our authorized representatives reserve the right to revoke any Beach Pass for violation of any of the above rules.

# **News from the Recreation Committee**

A Fairgrounds Working Group of volunteers from multiple town committees was created last January to address the need for a girls softball field and other amenities supporting outdoor recreation in the village area of town. On May 16th, a rough concept for a municipal softball field at the Fairgrounds property along with other potential amenities such as utilities, expanded parking, improved access to trails and field areas was presented to the public. The working group heard strong support for an outdoor basketball court.

If article 11 on the annual town meeting warrant is approved, the group will reconvene and incorporate this guidance into its work, seek partnerships and apply for grant funding to get it done. If article 11 passes, a afinal development plan will be presented to Town residents for approval in November, 2023 along with an estimated budget and plans to raise the necessary funds from outside sources.

Please vote yes on article 11 on June 13th to allow our work to proceed to improve the livability of our town and create a space for folks of all ages and abilities to enjoy in Readfield.

Article 11: Shall the Town vote to pursue the development of an expanded multi-use recreational field area at the Fairgrounds property, consistent with the Town's Fairgrounds Management Plan; with any final



project plans coming before the voters for approval; and with the project construction to be funded exclusively by Federal, State, and private grant sources and donations which the Town is hereby authorized to apply for, accept and expend?

# News & Notes from the Readfield Trails Committee

Hello Readfield Trail Enthusiasts,

I would like to start off by thanking our volunteer tractor operators and the students and teachers from Kents Hill School (see photos below) whose efforts allowed us to re-surface the Community Pathway from the Readfield Community Library to the Church Road. This included widening from the corner behind the Union Meeting House along the Alpaca enclosure to the Church Road. Our other bluestone trail system at the Readfield Fairgrounds, accessible from Church Road or the School Superintendent's office, remains in good shape. These are our most accessible trails for all ability levels.





The trails committee has received permission from the Maranacook Community School to explore putting a trail thru the school property on the town trail map. There are existing trails on the property that have not been maintained consistently that we will focus on, so it is unlikely we will need to clear much new trail. Any trail that we may mark and map will connect to the existing bluestone trails on the school property and the Fairgrounds.

Trails Committee representatives continue to represent trail users interests on the Fairgrounds Work Group for consideration of additional recreational developments thereon. The consensus so far is that a women's softball field and an improved porta-potty area should be developed. The concept plan also includes improvements to our trails, re-designed parking, and a pollinator garden area. The proposed trail improvements will significantly improve accessibility. No decision has been made on the basketball/pickleball court but there is strong interest in having an outdoor court somewhere in the village area so that discussion will continue. You have the opportunity to vote to allow the town to proceed with these additional developments on this month's election warrant (article 11). No town property taxpayer funding will be used for materials and construction. Donations and private and/or public grants will be used to fund the work. If warrant 11 passes, the Fairground Work Group will continue to meet to help create final design plans, and the search for outside funding will begin. Final engineered design plan approval will require a second vote possibly in November.

Lastly, now that summer is approaching and the ground is drying up, don't forget to take some time to experience the many trail opportunities we have in Readfield. There are trails for all abilities maintained by town committees and volunteers, and the Kennebec Land Trust (KLT). They range in length from short connector trails such as the Morrill Road Connector to networks over three miles in length such as the Carlton Pond Trail or the KLT's Rosmarin Property trails. See below for more information.

Our trail maps (not including the Carlton Pond Trail or Morrill Road Connector at this point) continue to be available at the town office and on-line (<a href="www.readfieldmaine.org/sites/readfieldme/files/uploads/readfield\_trails\_2019\_map.pdf">www.readfieldmaine.org/sites/readfieldme/files/uploads/ readfield\_trails\_2019\_map.pdf</a>). Kennebec Land Trust trail information can be found on their website at <a href="https://www.tklt.org">https://www.tklt.org</a> The map for the Carlton Pond Trail can be accessed using your smart phone camera and the QR code shown on the kiosk at the trailhead.

Please let us know if you encounter damage or other issues when on our town trails. We appreciate feedback.

Dog owners please note: Dogs are required to be on leash or under voice control on all town properties including our trails. We also request that pets be leashed on the Carlton Pond Trail in the interest of water supply and wildlife protection.



Remove ticks immediately. They usually need to attach for 24 hours to transmit Lyme disease. Consult a physician if you remove an engorged deer tick.

#### Using a tick spoon:

- · Place the wide part of the notch on the skin near the tick (hold skin taut if necessary)
- · Applying slight pressure downward on the skin, slide the remover forward so the small part of the notch is framing the tick
- · Continuous sliding motion of the remover detaches the tick

#### Using tweezers:

- · Grasp the tick close to the skin with tweezers
- · Pull gently until the tick lets go

#### **Torsey Pond Watershed Project Underway**

A two-year project aimed at improving and protecting the water quality of Torsey Pond is about to kick into high gear. The **Torsey Pond Watershed Protection Project, Phase I** is sponsored by the Cobbossee Watershed District (CWD) and is aimed at reducing nonpoint source (NPS) phosphorus pollution to the pond via the upgrade of private camp roads and public roads, repair and stabilization of severe erosion sites, shorefront stabilization and reduced phosphorus runoff, and general public education and outreach. Assisting the CWD on the project are the Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed (FOCW) with support from, and in cooperation with, the Torsey Pond Association (TPA). This project follows the 2015 Torsey Pond Watershed Survey Project that identified numerous NPS sites that contribute pollution, particularly phosphorus, to the pond, and follows recommendations of the Torsey Pond Watershed-Based Protection Plan (2020). According to CWD's Executive Director, Bill Monagle, the pond has maintained consistently good water quality over the past four decades, but measures should be taken to address NPS sources to provide long-term protection to Torsey Pond.

Key phases of the project involve 1) providing shoreline stabilization and/or buffer strip installation on shorefront properties around the pond, 2) upgrading and improving private and public roads and addressing other land uses that suffer surface erosion and other drainage problems, and 3) developing a watershed-wide community education and outreach program. Shorefront property owners will be eligible for cost-sharing opportunities to have work performed on their properties that will benefit the pond's water quality, as will private camp road owners and road associations that surround the pond. The latter will be eligible for up to 60% cost-sharing on selected projects.

The project is partly funded by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency under Section 319 of the Clean Water Act. The funding is administered by the Maine Department of Environmental protection in partnership with EPA. Were you overwhelmed by your heating costs over this past winter? Do you need help to reduce window drafts and keep your home warmer next winter? As a community service, the Winthrop Area Rotary Club is sponsoring our second Window Dressers Community Build this fall! This project will encourage homeowners and renters in Winthrop, Readfield, Wayne, Manchester and Monmouth to order indoor window inserts at no cost to you! Last year we built 190 window inserts and everyone who used them were very happy with the results. You can learn about these window inserts and how they are made at <a href="https://www.windowdressers.org">www.windowdressers.org</a>. Find out more and discuss the product with our

WindowDressers Insulating Window Inserts let in light while stopping drafts. Each insert is made of a custom-made pine frame wrapped on each side with tightly-sealed, clear polyolefin film, creating an airspace between the two layers for additional insulation. The insert is finished with a compressible foam gasket. The foam allows enough give for the inserts to be easily slid into place in the fall and removed in the spring, while holding firmly enough to provide a tight, friction-based seal. The inserts are installed inside of your existing window frame with no fasteners required.

The Winthrop Area Rotary will provide these inserts at **no cost** to participants. We rely on voluntary donations from those who are able to help support this important community project. Trained Rotary members will conduct the measuring visits and solicit participants to help in the construction or "build" of the frames based on individual orders this October in Winthrop at the Winthrop Middle School.

With rising costs everywhere, do yourself a favor and at least check out our community support project. You will not to be disappointed.
