



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The Benefits of Workshops

The Select Board recently met with the Chairs of our Boards and Committees for our annual meeting. This is an essential component of success with projects and provides an opportunity for everyone to be on the same page. It was good that we had ten folks present to be able to listen and provide input. We have a great deal of appreciation for all these folks do for our town and for working hard to successfully lead their group.

The Town Manager has assigned an employee contact for each group to assist the chairs in dealing with their charge and a matrix was distributed so everyone knows who to contact. This designee can provide information and assistance with many tasks and hopefully allow for easier and quicker resolution to problems that may arise. A spreadsheet, prepared by KVCOG, was also provided that lists the Comprehensive Plan Goals by committee. This will allow each committee to more easily identify what was laid out in the Comp Plan for them to consider as they approach their work. The Select Board will be discussing how best to use this information for guiding everyone's work and asking for input from each group. We want to stress that the Comp Plan is meant as a guide in most cases, though some items are required by law for the town to do, and we should always be mindful of public input throughout the implementation of each project.

The Chairs were congratulated for their collective improvement in providing timely minutes, both in draft and approved form, to the Town Clerk for inclusion on the town website. Agendas are to be posted publicly at least three days prior to meetings as well. This is helping with greater transparency by letting the public know what business is taking place in a timelier manner.

I asked, on behalf of the Select Board, for all boards, committees, commissions, staff and the Select Board to work together and to compromise in order to attain the goals everyone worked so hard to put together in the Comprehensive Plan. It is imperative that we each realize that no one can always get exactly what they want but that through discussion and active listening we can give a little and get a finished product that everyone can live with and support. It is in this way that we build a functioning community. It was pointed out that one tool groups can use is the updated Public Policy of Participation which along with a previously published agenda allows for business to be accomplished and for the public to provide input at specific times. In discussing when and how to revisit the Open Space Plan, which was last revised in 2006, it was suggested that we take the success of the format and function of the Fairgrounds Working Group which has representatives from five groups, and create an Open Space Working Group comprising representatives from the same five groups. This was met with agreement from all attending and will be created, advertised and appointed in April, May and June of 2024 with work to commence in July 2024. This is important work as it will lay out the next plan for working together to maintain and utilize the areas in our town that are considered open space. The 2006 plan defines this as: Open space, sometimes called green space, is any undeveloped land, private or public. It is land free of residential or commercial development that can include forests, fields, wetlands and waterbodies. It can include farmland and working forests, which provide for important wildlife habitat as well as for people's livelihoods. Open space can be improved land such as a park or ballfield, or unimproved land such as a wildlife preserve or other natural area, or just an undeveloped parcel of land. In rural communities like Readfield, the bulk of the open space is privatelyowned, unimproved, and unprotected.

Another area that is being considered and was discussed is how to effectively handle the growing recreation opportunities that are available in town for our children and our adults, being inclusive of all abilities. The town currently hires staffing for the town beach and maintenance of various town owned areas, but relies heavily on volunteers for all programming. We are looking at how this can be restructured to provide more efficient services and to expand offerings to more folks, especially adults. Stay tuned for discussion and to provide your input.

News from the Town Manager

Town Manager's Report - Volunteering

This message was probably more appropriate for November, but there is never a bad time to thank someone. There is also never a bad time to get involved in your community. I will address both of those things with my Messenger article this month!

I want to thank all of the members of our community who volunteer - a little or a lot, in Augusta or Readfield, for a non-profit organization or just to help out a neighbor. My window into the world of volunteering is often times limited to boards and committees and the more visible community organizations operating in town. However, there is a tremendous amount of volunteerism that happens outside of that view and it is just as important. I always encourage residents to get involved with municipal volunteer opportunities but I also want to encourage them to contribute in other ways. Volunteering is essential to maintaining a healthy community and as those who volunteer regularly know, it does a lot for the person doing the volunteering.

I recently had the opportunity to get involved with Boy Scout Troop 622 (serving Manchester, Mt. Vernon, Readfield, and Wayne) and it has been an incredibly rewarding experience. I was pushed outside of my comfort zone in many ways and have had to reassess how I manage my time and what things I value, but it is extraordinary seeing my son and other boys his age independently navigate a mile-long compass course through the woods, and be both excited and humbled by participating in the recent Veterans Day ceremony.

My hope is that everyone in Readfield can have a similar experience and see what can happen when they dig a little deeper, reach a little further, and give a little more. I hope they can see what it does for themselves and the people around them. We have a few "serial volunteers" in town who never seem to slow down. I am amazed by and grateful for their contributions. Not everyone has their time or energy but most everyone has a little, and just might find some more if they get involved with something that interests them.

As we approach a quieter time of year for most of us, I am hopeful that we can all think about how to volunteer or how to volunteer more. That could mean participating in one of the boards, committees, and commissions that our town is so fortunate to have. There are many open seats for a wide variety of interests and skill sets as well as varying levels of commitment. There is value in having a diversity of people involved with any endeavor and not everyone needs to be an expert. In fact it is often better if not everyone is! It could also mean finding an area of your own interest or need that has nothing to do with town government. The important thing is that you consider taking positive action to improve your community.

How to stay on the recycling "Nice" list this holiday season



Happy Holidays from ecomaine! 'Tis the season for "decking the halls" and potluck parties galore. Here at ecomaine, we receive about a third of Maine's recyclables, or roughly 41,000 tons annually, which means we see evidence every day of serve ware, packages and decorations that are ripe with opportunity to be recycled right. That's why we have created this Naughty and Nice list to remind you of what can be recycled.

RECYCLING DOs to get you on the Nice list this holiday season: Aside from all of your standard household mixed paper and assorted rigid containers made of cardboard, plastic, glass, tin or aluminum, there are a number of items that are commonly used at the holidays that you can recycle. Here are the top five:

- 1. Wrapping paper that rips: If it rips, it recycles. Put it to the rip test and it if passes, place it in your bin.
- 2. Holiday cards: even if they have glitter on them, they are recyclable. Don't let all of that recyclable paper go to waste this season, put them in your recycling bin!
- 3. Aluminum foil pans: Whether its pie plates, fruit cake pans or any other aluminum pan, remember the rule that if the pan is not caked with sticky, thick food residue, then the pans are recyclable. The same goes for aluminum foil! Aluminum is a very nice material for your recycling bin!
- 4. **Cardboard and gift boxes:** With the rise of cybershopping, you might have a bigger inventory of cardboard boxes, never mind those gift boxes that make such pretty packages under the tree. Break them down flat before placing them in your bin to ensure enough space for the higher volume of recyclables you are likely to incur through the holidays.
- 5. Cookie tins: When you receive tins of cookies, consider saving them to contain your own baked gift next year, or donating them to Goodwill or any other salvage shop. But if they are no longer useful, do place them in your recycling bin!

Recycling DON'Ts that will land you on the Naughty list:

- 1. Bows and ribbon: there is no way to recycle these, so your best bet is to save them and reuse them each year or do away with disposable gift wrap altogether with decorative cloth gift bags. Bows and ribbon are naughty for the recycling bin.
- 2. Wrapping paper that doesn't rip: If your wrapping paper doesn't rip, then it is probably made of plastic vs. paper and therefore cannot be recycled. We'll talk about the wrapping paper you can recycle when we list the "Nice" to recycle list.
- 3. Christmas tree lights: Maybe you're trimming the tree only to discover that last year's lights are no longer repairable. In this case, your best bet is to donate them to a local Goodwill store. They can sell broken lights onto the market because of the valuable copper wires usually contained inside. Whatever you do, don't put them in your recycling bin, as they will end up clogging ecomaine's sorting equipment. They go in the metal collection bin.
- Foil caked with residue: Aluminum foil is endlessly recyclable - if it is not caked with cheese or another sticky, messy residue. If it is caked with residue, you are best off tossing it in the trash.
- 5. **Plastic cutlery:** If you can avoid it altogether, that is the best strategy, but if you need to use it, consider reusing it again and again. When you can't use it any longer, you should put this type of plastic in the trash, not your recycling bin.

For a week in early November, Maranacook High School and Middle School held their annual food drives to support the pantry. It is not news to anyone that food prices are higher and more of our community members are having difficulty getting enough food. It is with pride and thankfulness that I am able to write that this year's drive was one of our most productive in recent years. The numbers don't lie! Our middle school collected close to 2.000 food items and \$1,208.40 in cash donations. Staff member and Readfield resident Gwen Mohlar was the go to person who directed the drive and had huge support from staff and students.

An interesting fact, the snowmobile industry brought in over \$606 million dollars in


