

Spring Is In The Air By: Kathryn Mills Woodsum

It appears that Spring may be arriving early this year as evidenced by our local roads already being posted for heavy loads. The work of the town continues on our annual cycle which places us squarely in the middle of budget season. All volunteer town boards, committees and commissions along with town departments have presented their requests to the town manager and budget committee and they have been reviewed and discussed. The budget is being fine tuned and prepared for our first public hearing on Wednesday March 20th where residents can express their thoughts and ask for revisions. This is the time where changes can be considered and made prior to the warrant articles being written. Please review the Budget Committee minutes and their agendas or contact the town office for more information. They have a tab on the town website under Boards and Committees where you can find all of the latest information. The following two public hearings in May are informational only and no changes can be made by that time; only discussion for or against an article.

The Budget Committee met with the Select Board in January to review and discuss the Capital Investment Plan, known as the CIP. This plan lays out the known and expected capital costs exceeding \$10,000 per item for the next five years. The primary purpose of this budgeting tool is to effectively level the costs year-to-year so there are no large increases or decreases from the municipal budget to the tax rate in the town. Readfield has been utilizing this tool for 15 years and find it very useful planning and scheduling needed projects. It is essentially a long-term budgeting tool similar to what people use in their own personal planning. This worksheet is also available online under the Budget Committee.

The Church Road Sidewalk project continues to move along with a hearing held in February where 50%-plans were introduced. The engineers have incorporated many of the ideas that had been expressed in previous meetings and through written comment. The project will now be developed into a warrant article for this year's town meeting vote. There have been several town votes on this project beginning in 2017 and this year's is the culmination of 7 years of work and collaboration with Maine DOT and the federal Bicycle and Pedestrian program to increase safety for folks utilizing our roads and trails for travel. Information on this important town project can be found on the town website under Departments, then Road Commissioner. More information will be coming in the town warrant.

The Fairgrounds Community Park working group has finalized the plans for additional improvements to the fairgrounds property and has entered the fundraising stage of the project. The plan was approved by voters at our last town meeting to proceed with further refinement of the plans with all funding to come from sources other than local taxes. Half of the funding will be from a federal program through the Land & Water Conservation Fund. We are currently applying for assistance from the Innovative Readiness Training program of the National Guard through the Defense Department and for a grant from the Harold Alfond Foundation. These efforts will be supported by local donations from residents and businesses through a fundraising drive currently being developed for pledges. Stay tuned for more information and ways that you can become involved. Go to the town website under Boards & Committees then Fairground Working Group for all the latest news. The latest plan is under the agendas section dated January 17th. The final vote for project approval will be on this year's town warrant.

Please enjoy all the town has to offer as the weather becomes warmer. Sports programs for children, trails and sidewalks for walking, and lots of committee meetings where you can meet other residents and enjoy making a difference in your community.

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Town Manager Report

Browntail Moth Control

We still have a few more weeks of winter ahead of us but there are some things we can do to make our lives better when spring does finally arrive. Residents should be aware of and manage for Browntail Moth activity. The State of Maine is becoming more engaged with this and has added Browntail Moth information to their 2-1-1 program resources. You can also find information through the Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation, and Forestry.

The Town of Readfield currently has a "no-spray" policy for publicly owned property. However, we will pursue physical control efforts where appropriate, including spring-time removal of overwintering nests. If you see any suspect nests on Town of Readfield property please report them to Town Staff.



On your own property please consider taking similar control measures by identifying and removing browntail nests. The late winter months are a great time to do this. Here are the "Four R's" to keep in mind:

- 1. **Recognize** browntail winter webs (see photo below). Check the tips of tree branches for palm-sized (2-5 inches long) webs tied to the leaf stem with white silk. Browntail strongly prefer to make their webs in oak, apple, crabapple, cherry, birch, poplar, shadbush, and rose bushes.
- 2. **Remove** browntail winter webs. Use hand snips or an extendable pole pruner in areas within reach of the ground and away from hazards such as powerlines. Protect your eyes and skin during removal as toxic caterpillars may still be present. After removal, destroy webs:
 - Obtain burn permit and burn them in a contained fire, or
 - Soak them in a bucket of soapy water for a few days before disposing
- 3. **Recruit** professional help when you can't remove winter webs. <u>Licensed arborists</u> or Recruit professional help when you can't remove winter webs. Licensed arborists or FAA-certified drone operators can help remove webs during the winter. Licensed pesticide applicators may be able to use pesticides on trees with browntail during early spring to reduce browntail populations.
- 4. **Reach Out** if you find browntail in your neighborhood. The more neighbors, businesses, and others that work together to respond to browntail, the better the results.



Early Spring Weather Town Roads Posted

During the spring local roads weaken and they need to be protected. As temperatures warm and the ground thaws, soil under pavement and gravel becomes saturated with water, making the surface unstable. As a result many roads cannot support heavy loads. This spring is arriving early, and bringing road condition issues with it.

To protect our roads from serious damage - and subsequent repair costs that have to be paid for by taxpayers, the Town of Readfield has posted heavy load limits on vehicles over 23,000 pounds through April 15 unless removed earlier. Our roads are posted in accordance with Title 29-A MRSA 2395.

Here are a few tips to help navigate posted roads:

- Weight restrictions do not apply to certain materials like heating oil and propane, animal feed, and other necessities.
- Weight restrictions do not apply if the road is solidly frozen this means that during a significant portion of the posting period heavy loads are able to travel in the early morning with just a little advanced planning.
- If you are ordering appliances from any box store be sure to let them know at the time of purchase that your local roads are posted and they will need to use a smaller delivery vehicle.

The Town does sometimes allow for exemptions under extraordinary circumstances. This will require permission from our Road Commissioner or Deputy Road Commissioner. The Road Commissioner can be reached by calling 685-4939 or 931-7680 or by email. An exemption certificate will be issued to anyone with permission and must be kept in the vehicle during travel.

• If someone is caught traveling on a posted road (in a vehicle weighing more than 23,000 pounds) without permission they may be issued a fine and may be subject to possible restitution to the Town for damages to the road. To report weight limit violations, contact the Town Office or Road Commissioner.

Thank you in advance for helping to protect our roads, maintain road access, and save tax dollars on unnecessary road repairs!

FREE Battery Recycling

The Transfer Station can now recycle even more battery types. Better yet, it'll still *FREE*!



We're now working with a national not-for-profit organization, <u>Call2Recycle</u>

Just bring your single-use and rechargeable batteries in and give them to an attendant, and we'll take it from there. This includes those single-use alkaline batteries we used to simply dispose of in our trash.

It also includes rechargeable tool batteries. It does not include any damaged, or defective batteries, batteries weighing more than 11 pounds, or batteries over 300 watt hours-like those that power e-scooters, e-bikes and larger outdoor power equipment.

If you have any questions, just ask us at the transfer station.

Thank you for working with us to reduce the overall waste stream and recycle as much as possible.

Readfield Transfer Station and Beach Stickers

The NEW Readfield window stickers are your pass to the Transfer Station AND the Town Beach. Using a single sticker and no longer requiring a separate beach application should make accessing these two public facilities easier!


Here's how it will work:


- Residents and non-resident taxpayers will replace their current window stickers or add new ones at the Town Office, the Transfer Station, or Beach.
- Eligibility will be verified by Town Staff by checking for an existing sticker or
- proof of current Readfield vehicle
- registration. Other forms of verification will be looked at if necessary for non-resident taxpayers.
- There will no longer be a separate Beach Application, but all Beach Rules will
 continue to apply and non-resident beach guests are still expected to pay the
 appropriate fee.
- Placing the sticker on your vehicle is your acknowledgement and commitment to follow the rules of the Transfer Station and Beach.
- Access to Town facilities can be revoked by Town Staff for inappropriate use or behavior. Beach Rules are included on the reverse side of this sheet and Transfer Station Rules are available at the facility.
- Window stickers can be issued for multiple vehicles but we ask that they only be requested for those intended to be used for Transfer Station and Beach access.
- Window stickers MUST be adhered to the front windshield and not on a hanger, on the dash, etc.
- Non-residents and transient visitors will still be able to get temporary passes to both the Beach and Transfer Station, again for a fee if applicable.
- Fayette and Wayne residents who use the Transfer Station will also be issued new stickers, but they will be different colors and have their own town seal on them. They will not have access to the Readfield Town Beach without paying for a special non-resident pass.

INSTRUCTIONS

SECTION 1.

Check the appropriate box related to each question. You must check all three boxes to qualify for the Maine homestead property tax exemption. If you have moved during the year and owned a homestead in Maine prior to your move, enter the address of the homestead you moved from on line 1b. Your ownership of a homestead must have been continuous for the 12-month period ending on April 1. If you did not check all boxes in this section, you do not qualify for the homestead property tax exemption.

Line 1a: "Permanent resident" means an individual who has established a permanent residence. A "permanent residence" means that place where an individual has a true, fixed, and permanent home and principal establishment to which the individual, whenever absent, has the intention of returning. An individual may have only one permanent residence at a time and, once a permanent residence is established, that residence is presumed to continue until circumstances indicate otherwise.

A person on active duty serving in the Armed Forces of the United States who is permanently stationed at a military or naval post, station or base in this state is deemed to be a permanent Maine resident. A person on active duty serving in the Armed Forces of the United States does not include a member of the National Guard or the Reserves.

Line 1b: "Homestead" means residential real property owned by an individual or individuals and occupied by those individuals as their permanent residence. Residential real property held in a revocable living trust for a beneficiary who occupies the property as his or her permanent residence also qualifies as a homestead.

An owner of a life estate is considered the owner of the property for purposes of the homestead exemption; however, the owner of a life lease is not. A resident homeowner who is subject to foreclosure and subsequently purchases the home back from the municipality is considered to have no interruption in homeownership for purposes of this exemption.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> Enter your full name(s) as shown on your property tax bill, the physical location of your home, your telephone number, email address, and your mailing address, if different than the physical location.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> This section gives the local assessor information which may be used to determine if you qualify and should support your answers to the questions in Section 1. Please check the appropriate box for each of the applicable statements in this section.

At least one of the owners of the homestead must sign this document. Please file the application with your local municipal assessor. If, for any reason, you are denied exemption by the assessor, you may appeal the assessor's decision under the abatement process found in 36 M.R.S. § 841.

PROPOSED READFIELD COMMUNITY PARK LOOKING FOR FOLKS TO HELP MAKE IT A REALITY!

Over the past year, a group of dedicated Readfield residents, with diverse interests, has been working hard to come up with a consensus plan for a proposed Fairgrounds Community Park. The plan calls for the construction of a softball field and basketball court (also to be used for pickleball), recreational facilities that are greatly needed in our community. The plan also includes accessible trails, a pollinator garden and expanded parking. The existing baseball field, when combined with the new softball field, provides a space that can be used for other sports such as soccer, as well as community events. Importantly, the plan also preserves important meadow habitat and the existing walking trail system.

Instead, the goal is to seek federal grants matched by private contributions from foundations, businesses and individuals.

To make this happen, we need a new group of residents willing to lead a fundraising campaign for the Fairgrounds Community Park. The Working Group created the vision, now we need people to help make that vision a reality.

READFIELD PROGRAM ABOUT THE MURDER OF MATTIE HACKETT


The Readfield Historical Society (RHS) will hold its 2024 annual meeting on Saturday at 1:00 p.m., March 16th at Gile Hall, 8 Old Kents Hill Road. Following a brief business meeting, election of officers, and the annual recognition of a (hopefully surprised) volunteer, a program will be given by author, Peter M. Pettingill about his newly released book regarding the August, 1905 murder of Mattie Hackett.

Hackett was a recent Kents Hill School student and working at the Elmwood Hotel in Readfield Corner that summer when she was murdered near her parents' farm on P Ridge Road. A year's long investigation ensued, which Pettingill recounts in his historical novel The Murder of Mattie Hackett. Diligently researched and vividly detailed, the book delves into the people involved, the political and social factors that drove the case, and the mysteries that still surround Hackett's murder over a century later. The book spans more than a decade, from the time of Hackett's murder in 1905 through the investigations and eventual trial of a Readfield woman in 1912. Pettingill took great care to examine the suspects, witnesses, personalities, setting, and time period that contributed to the unfolding real-life drama. The Murder of Mattie Hackett is an engaging read for true crime fans and history buffs. RHS historian and genealogist Dale Potter-Clark related, "Anyone who has heard stories about this murder from their grandparents or older Readfield townspeople over the years will learn a good deal from the significant information the book divulges, much of which is assuredly unknown to anyone alive today."

Peter Pettingill will be available to sell and sign his book at the event.

The Readfield Historical Society was established in 1985 to preserve the rich history of Readfield and its people through research, community outreach, the preservation of artifacts, textiles, documents and photos.
