MCHS & KHS Students Volunteer for Readfield Trails and Conservation Commission by Greg Durgin

On September 21, 2016, Patrick Forgue and his 8 member advisee group participated in Maranacook's annual fall Advisee Day Out by volunteering to help repair and provide upkeep for Readfield's trail system. They hauled wheelbarrows filled with blue stone and upgraded about 200 feet of trail. This was no small feat as the blue stone had to be hauled. unloaded, and then raked to a depth of 4 inches over a 6 ft wide base layer. Thank you to Maranacook's Sara Chisholm, this year's coordinator for Advisee Day Out and to Patrick and his advisees for their generous help.

Maranacook's Advisee Day Out, held every September since 1976, provides the four communities with students from the junior class who support their communities by offering their services to both the RSU # 38 towns and individuals who can use their help. Readfield's Trails Committee and Conservation Commission usually request a group or two to help with town projects. Members of both town groups work side by side with the students and advisor for the day.

In October, Kents Hill School offers groups of students to Readfield for their day of community service. This vear Tamara Stockwell coordinated the program. On October 4. 10 students and two of their teachers, Steve Bell and R.J. Jenkins, picked up where the Maranacook students left off hauling the blue stone and continued to improve another 200 feet of trail until the blue stone supply ran out. Many of the KHS students and their staff members were just getting to know one another but their

work ethic and camaraderie were infectious. Great effort and results from both schools. Thank you!

KHS actually does a second day in the spring and last April 21 students and staff along with Conservation Commission members dug a drainage ditch and seeded it in a Fairgrounds field area alongside a trail that had washed out a couple of times in the past. In all three situations with students from both schools, the volunteers' energy and enthusiasm were much appreciated. Our town certainly is fortunate to have the help from both schools. We look forward to their continued support.

There are currently three openings on the Trails Committee. Apply and be part of this energetic group working to make Readfield an enjoyable and healthy place to live.

Following this, walkers will follow Church Road and Main Street to Gile Hall, 8 Old Kents Hill Road, to join in a tribute to Veterans starting at 11:00 a.m. After the tribute a soup and bread luncheon will be provided by Torsey Church (RUMC), starting at 11:15, upstairs at Gile Hall.

Parking is available at the Old Fairgrounds parking lot on Church Road. Those who do not wish to walk to Gile Hall are welcome to drive there. Drivers will be available to chauffeur walkers back to the Old Fairground's parking lot from Gile Hall if desired. Veterans and all others are encouraged to attend all or any part of this event.

This Veterans' Day event is a collaborative effort by members of the Readfield History Walkers, Town of Readfield Select Board, Readfield Heritage Days Committee, Readfield Cemetery Committee and Torsey Memorial Church (RUMC). The objectives of Readfield History Walks are for participants to learn more about the surrounding area - both current and historical - while enjoying the beauty and invigoration of the outdoors. Oll and Water by the Town Manager



Oil and water - two things we can't seem to live without. However, they can both create challenges for our residents.

Getting rid of an old oil tank isn't easy but it can be done at the Readfield and Wayne Transfer Station for FREE! Oil tanks must be empty prior to disposal. To ensure that no oil or sludge remains, whole tanks delivered to the transfer station must have large diameter holes drilled in the bottom. They can also be delivered cut into pieces with any sludge removed. The Transfer Station also accepts used motor and cooking oils at no cost! If you have questions about oil tanks or waste oils please ask at the Transfer Station or call Glen or Mike at 685-3144.

We've had some rain recently but many waterbodies are still low, as is the groundwater table. If you have experienced changes in the quantity or quality of your well water there are many resources available to help:

- Contact 2-1-1 to report a dry well.
- Contact a well driller to discuss your options. You can find licensed drillers through the Maine Well Driller's Commission.
- Look into the Maine State Housing Home Repair Program and the USDA's Single Family Housing Loans and Grants to see if you qualify.
- Call the free wellcare® Hotline at 888-395-1033 Monday-Friday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Emergency General Assistance benefits may be available through the Town of Readfield.

Support is also available for farmers and small business owners affected by the drought conditions. They can access many of the resources listed above as well as the USDA Farm Service Agency's Disaster Assistance Program and SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans. 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LAFAYETTE MASONIC LODGE IN READFIELD GETS A FACELIFT

In driving through Readfield Corner these days one cannot help but notice a change taking place. The green exterior of the "Masonic block" has disappeared and is being replaced by new gray siding. "I do not recall it being any other color but green" said Evelyn Adell Potter, 86, lifetime resident and Readfield Historian. A surprise discovery was made when it was removed - the original brown clapboards, added in 1921 when the building was constructed, are still in place. Ed Dodge of Readfield, Mason and treasurer for 50+ years, said "They don't look too bad but maintenance of the wooden clapboards would create too much labor and expense." He and the lodge secretary John Lord both shared that Readfield Masons are able to install the new siding, and they've also repaired the roof, because of a bequest from Readfield native Thomas Adell, who died in February of 2013. He was a member of the lodge for more than 50 years and the Post Master at Readfield Corner Post Office for nearly 30 years, which is located on the first floor of the building. "He loved the Masons and did a lot for them through the years" said Potter, his niece.

The Masons have existed in Readfield for 190 years but, as a "secret society", their ceremonies and the services they provide have been conducted more discreetly than this building project. In 1909 a comprehensive history of their Lafayette Lodge No. 48 was compiled. The book gives details of various members including support extended to some Masons in need, their surviving widows and children and community events. For instance, when they found one fellow Mason's widow was "feeble in health and destitute of funds..." not only did they help her at that moment but they supported her for the following twenty-six years.

The first record of the Mason's presence in this town was in 1817 when Temple Lodge in Winthrop invited some Readfield men to join them. Over the next few years ten men joined the Winthrop group and in 1825 they petitioned for their own charter. Purportedly they chose "Lafayette Lodge" as the name because of the Marquis de Lafayette's visit to Maine that same year. The charter was granted on January 13, 1826 and the first three meetings were held in homes at Readfield Corner. Almost immediately arrangements were made to construct a hall on the second floor of a store on the north side of Main Street. Concurrently the new lodge members made plans to lay a cornerstone for the Union Meeting House (UMH) and help with its construction. Many of the UMH founders were also Masons and over the years they held a number of events and ceremonies there.

Meetings were held regularly until the "Dark Days of Masonry" - a national movement against the Masons that arose following a scandal in New York. Meetings ceased in Readfield from 1832 until September of 1849 when a few members came back together after seventeen years of silence. The revived order leased the second floor of a building on the south side of Main Street; steady growth ensued to eventually reach an active membership of 156, according to Lord. Lafayette Lodge expanded their space to include the third floor and in 1917 they purchased the entire building.

On June 11, 1921 lightning struck a kerosene barrel in the store adjacent to the Masonic Lodge. With that, a fire started that destroyed most of the buildings at Readfield Corner. According to an account by the late Roy Giles, he and another Mason were able to save an armful of record books, papers and the secretary's desk from the Masonic Lodge but all other contents were destroyed. The Masons rebuilt on the original foundation but plans for a larger structure required additional land so an adjoining lot was purchased. Three months after the fire a ceremonial setting of the cornerstone was held. They took out a mortgage to rebuild which was not discharged until 1969 when, interestingly enough, Thomas Adell was Master of the lodge.

In 1974 the Masons bought property on the east side of the Masonic Hall, tore down the deteriorating house and turned the vacant lot into a parking area. The Lafayette Lodge has rented their first floor to several entities since 1921 including merchants, insurance agents, a radio and TV repairman, beauticians, gift shops, bakeries, the Readfield Telephone and Telegraph Company and, since 1963, the U.S. Post Office. Lodge membership has dwindled to sixty-five, according to Lord, but dedicated members continue to meet on a regular basis. The Temple Masonic Lodge and Abenaki Eastern Star from Winthrop meet at Lafayette Lodge now as well.

Thanks to Adell's bequest roof repairs have been completed and the installation of new siding is well underway. "This is an expensive project" said Dodge. "Adell's bequest gave an excellent kick-start but we do need to raise more funds to completely finance the job." Dodge explained that a longtime member has pledged \$20,000 if Lafayette Lodge can raise an equal amount. Letters have gone out to members and contributions have come in from some of them. Several townspeople and family members of Masons have given as well. "We appreciate any help people are willing to give towards reaching the \$20,000 match. The results of these efforts will last through our lifetimes and we hope for a long time into the future." Contributions can be sent to Lafayette Building Corp. PO Box 243 Readfield, ME 04355. Those with interest in joining the Masons can contact any member they know, or can call John Lord at 685-4266.

As for future projects, Lord and Dodge shared that Lafayette Lodge #48 wants to meld the past with the present by establishing an area of recognition and memoriam inside the Masonic Lodge. "Family members sometimes contact us to offer memorabilia from Readfield Masons who have passed" said Dodge. We would like to create a place of honor and remembrance for them."

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Work underway at Union Meeting House

Local folks have noted a trailer the UMH in the last couple of weeks. The crew from Maine Barn Co., the contractor hired to replace the floor undercarriage, has arrived and begun the preliminary steps necessary to do this major project. Phase I will focus on the narthex, the front third of the building that contains the entrances, stairways, closet, choir and the steeple. The entire front of the building within the brick walls must be jacked up so as to insert new beams and joists to halt further settling of the building's floor. (Phase II in 2017 will attack problems in the flooring substructure under the sanctuary.)

The specs and working drawings drawn up by Preservation Timber Framing of Berwick put great emphasis on proceeding in a manner that does not damage the interior plaster walls with the famous Charles Schumacher murals. The work will be slow and methodical so as to respect the historical value and importance of the murals. Phase I is being funding with grants from the Davis Family Foundation and the Maine Historic Preservation Commission, together with monies the UMH has saved through the years.

Phase II poses a different challenge. Sufficient funds are not on hand at this time to proceed and funds are now being actively sought. A hard-working fund-raising committee within the Board has developed a pledge campaign seeking the involvement of Readfield citizens and other friends of the Meeting House. This is an ambitious move and more will be forthcoming in upcoming *Messenger* columns. In brief, however, the UMH is merely trying to involve the town's citizens in preserving the town's most famous landmark.

From the fund-raising committee comes this report: It has fashioned a packet of material for the purpose of attracting donors and/board members. Help outside the Readfield area was graciously provided by the following people. Don Shook of FinePoint Communications in Las Vegas, a public relations man, who donated his time and expertise to edit the text, and Kurt Breeding, a software specialist from Kansas City, Mo, who donated his time and talent to arrange the photographs and fit them into the text. The materials will be used as members of the UMH Board speak with potential donors about helping the restoration efforts, and with potential board members about joining the team.
