Hello, I hope everyone didn't have any severe damage in the micro burst we had a few weeks ago. Torsey Pond residents appear to have been hit the hardest. There were also quite a bit of blow downs behind MCS on the cross country ski trails that have been cleaned up. Our Fairgrounds Park trail paralleling the cemetery had a very large cluster of hard woods that toppled over uprooting its base exposing a very large hole and root system about

10 feet in diameter. When you see the cut off tree stumps you will not be able to imagine that the whole tree and its root system had been torn from the ground as it all fell back in place.

Readfield Trails volunteers Todd and Bob went up on Saturday morning and cleared a section lying across the trail giving access for users over the weekend. On Monday, Bob and Larry cut up the remaining trees in wood stove size. Joining me pulling away brush and stacking the firewood as well as making sure everyone was well hydrated on this very hot day were: Dana, Amy, Jeanne, Ann, and Lydia.

If you are a Readfield resident and qualify for heat assistance please contact the town manager about receiving some of this firewood. We are still looking for someone who has a wood splitter and would like to supervise a group of volunteers to split up this wood. Please contact me if you are available.

A second reminder that this October, as we have done for 10 years, we will have a much anticipated work day with Kent's Hill and Maranacook students. This is a very special time to not just accomplish a lot of trail work, but to enjoy the youthful enthusiasm that the kids bring each year. You do not have to be a trail member to join us,

Union Meeting House

The Maine Historic Preservation Commission announced that it has awarded a \$25,000

grant to the Readfield Union Meeting House to help meet the cost of the rebuilding the entire floor substructure. An earlier \$35,000 grant from the Davis Family Foundation, added to funds from UMH members and income from investments, will go to meet the total cost of Phase I of over \$130,000.

Phase I will consist of properly supporting the arch that leads to the apse (which was not properly done during 1985 foundation repair) and replacing all the rotted and weakened floor supports, joists and beams at the front of the building. This is the area known as the narthex, an architectural term to differentiate the front portion of the edifice from the sanctuary of the church. The narthex consists, therefore, of the entrance vestibules, the choir, the tower above it and the two stairways to the second floor. This work will be very delicate since the vertical timbers that support the tower will have to be jacked up so new beams can be inserted under the floor, all while taking care not to crack the plaster walls with the famous murals.

The Board's Bid Evaluation Committee, consisting of Jim Tukey, John Perry, local engineer Doug Riley and Board president Marius B. Peladeau, have narrowed the bids from contractors down to one finalist and it hopes to announces the signing of a contract in the very near future. If so, this will allow work to start on the narthex reconstruction this fall. Phase II, planned for 2017, will tackle the deteriorated supports of the floor in the sanctuary. Fund raising efforts to raise monies for this part of the project will begin shortly. Funds are available for Phase I, but this work will severely deplete the UMH's bank account. A major campaign is planned this fall and into 2017 to raise the Phase II funds. Adding up the costs of Phase I and Phase II the total will come to \$245,000. Since monies to pay for only Phase I are on hand at this point, it demonstrates the challenge facing the Meeting House's Board as it try to raise the remainder.

UMH Honors Jack and Anita Smart

On August 13, during the annual open house, the Board of the UMH honored Jack And Anita Smart for their over three decades of involvement in the restoration of the building. While they lived in Readfield

Jack was Board president, Board member and is currently a member of the Advisory Board. In all these activities he was supported by his wife, Anita. When Board President Peladeau presented the certificate of appreciation to Jack he pointed out it was a small token compared to all that Jack had done for the UMH over so many years, but it was a heart-felt and sincere recognition of his efforts. Thanks Jack and Anita.

Historical Society Notes by Flo Drake

Here it is nearly September and our season is winding down. We had another successful summer of helping folks with quests to find family, as well as research on former farms and camps. We seemed to have had more visitors "from away" this year, folks who either used to live in the area or went to camp here as kids. All visitors were very pleased with our museum and schoolroom, and many of them had been students at the Depot School, which is the RHS building.

All in all, it has been a good summer for Readfield Historical Society.

Due to requests by our last audience, there will be another FREE MOVIE NIGHT, this one on Friday, September 16. The venue has been changed due to a generous offer from Nicole Danielson for us to use the upstairs of the old Grange Hall on the Church Rd., now Community Maple Tree School . It will give folks a chance to see the inside of what was once one of the most important buildings in town. Movies to be shown will be "Grammie Turner", a 30-minute documentary about a West Peru (Maine) farm woman, made in 1976. This video was produced at WCBB (Channel 10) in Lewiston and ended up being shown all over the US, having been picked up by the Eastern Education Network. Marv Turner would receive letters from people in California or Texas, honoring her for her hardworking lifestyle and upbeat attitude. These letters made her truly happy.

The second video is called "The Maine Frontier: Through the Lens of Isaac Walton Simpson". It is a 60-minute documentary about a hardworking master-of-all-trades who also took pictures. Working with glass negatives around the turn of the 1900's, Isaac Simpson had a natural sense of composition, detail and empathy that



made his pictures of farm families in Aroostook County true historic records. Supporting a wife and 13 children (!) in what was literally a frontier up there, Simpson worked as a blacksmith, lumberman, barber, mechanic, and musician, being gone sometimes for weeks at a time. And as he traveled around Maine working, he took photos. His glass negatives were barely saved from being used as skeet, many hundreds already lost to the This documentary is his bullet. story.

That's about all for this month. Good luck with your canning, do something wonderful with those apples, and come to Free Movie Night on the 16th.
