# From the Desk of the Town Manager, Eric Dyer



#### Winter Maintenance of Town Properties

With several winter storms already behind us I want to address a few questions I've received and give a little more information with respect to winter maintenance of municipal properties and infrastructure. The Town of Readfield and our capable maintenance staff are responsible for maintaining Gile Hall, the Fire Station, the Library, and several recreational parking areas (including the Fairgrounds and trailheads on Fogg Rd. and at the Torsey Pond Preserve). We are also responsible for the sidewalk from the corner by Millard Hrrison Drive (the access road to the High and Middle schools) to the Town office and the small sections in front of the Family Market and Emporium. We are not responsible for the area in front of the Post Office, any of the parking spaces at Readfield Corner, or the access road to the bank building.

As you might expect there are differing service needs for the areas the Town maintains. The Fire station is a top priority for obvious reasons. No more than a few inches of snow should be allowed to accumulate at any time and the building must always be accessible. The Town Office, Library, and Transfer Station are the next highest priorities and as a general rule they should be clear ½ hour prior to opening and no more than a few inches of snow should be allowed to accumulate in the parking lots during open hours. Access areas, stairs, and walkways should be kept clear and safe to foot traffic at all times these buildings are in use. Keeping these buildings and lots clear can take a lot of time, so lower priority is given to the less frequently used sidewalk and "remote" parking areas. They are of course taken care of as soon as possible, but should always be cleared and sanded no less than 24 hours after the end of a storm.

The unpredictability of the weather, equipment failures, and the availability of staff can impact our ability to meet these expectations all of the time but we do make every effort to do so. Feedback from residents


is a very important part of ensuring this happens so if you notice an area that needs attention or have any questions about winter maintenance of town properties, please contact me.



# **Mailbox Guildlines**


Readfield's snowplow contractor will take all precautions to avoid striking mailboxes with the wing of the plow. Below are some tips for mailbox placement to help reduce the chances of damage during winter plowing:

- Mailbox post size must not exceed 4" by 4" for a wooden post or 2" diameter for a steel pipe post for roadside barrier safety. Posts that are more substantial in construction are considered "deadly fixed objects" and are not permitted within the Town's right-of-way.
- Mailboxes and any supports should be installed at least 42 inches high to
  provide clearance for the plow wing as shown in the picture. We recommend
  the use of an extended arm type of post with a free-swinging suspended
  mailbox. This allows snowplows to sweep near or under boxes without
  damage to supports and provides easy access to the boxes by carrier and
  customers.
- Below you will find a sketch showing the recommended location for your mailbox. Placing the mailbox on the side of your driveway away from approaching traffic will allow our driver to properly clear the roadway and to get as close as possible to your mailbox to minimize the amount of shoveling you will have to do to clear the mailbox for the postal carrier.



- For uncurbed roadways set the mailbox back at the far edge of the road shoulder (at least 3 feet back from
  pavement edge, when possible) to provide the maximum possible roadway clearance. For curbed roads the
  face of the mailbox should be 8-12 inches back from the curb face.
- To assist emergency vehicles, please place reflective material on the side of the box visible to approaching traffic with 4" high letters to identify the address.

In the event your mailbox is damaged by the plow we ask you to make any needed temporary repairs. If you are unable to make such repairs on your own please call our Snow Plow Contractor, John Cushing 242-8075 or 685-4742 and his crew will attempt to repair or replace the mailbox when time permits. Substantially damaged property will be replaced in the spring with a basic metal mailbox. Newspaper boxes will not be repaired or reset by the Town or plow contractor in any event.



The Town and plow contractor will not replace or reimburse for custom made mailboxes, ornate posts or granite post, etc., existing mailboxes with rotted posts or in obviously poor condition, or any mailboxes that have not been located according to these guidelines. State of Maine law views mailboxes as an encroachment in the public way put there at the owner's risk and municipalities are not legally liable for any damage or repairs to mailboxes due to plowing operations.

by the Bittars. The trail that brings you to the Mill Stream Dam starts just 50 yards north of the Town Office on the Old Kent's Hill Road or off route 17 on the Mill Stream Road. In the upcoming spring we will let you know about additional fun raising projects.

Easements and Agreements with private land owners continue to play a major role in accomplishing the goals of the 2006 Open Space Plan to create a safe trails system that connects many areas of Readfield without residents walking on the open road.

If anyone wants a bucket of sand delivered, please call the town office and a bucket will be provided.


Anyone wanting to volunteer to help deliver the buckets please contact the Age Friendly Committee through the town office.

# **Union Meeting House Work Continues**

Fluctuations in the weather, including some very cold days, have not prevented the craftsmen from Maine Barn Co. from moving ahead on the reconstruction of the floor under the front part of the building. The large beams that will hold up the floor, the back wall of the sanctuary, the choir and the back portion of the steeple have arrived. These beams were special ordered since no lumber mill or lumber yard in the state had the capacity to provide such massive timbers. Not only did their size make them difficult to obtain, but they had to sent out to be pressure treated.

#### A Historical Note

It was one hundred years ago that a fierce winter storm blew off the spire at the top of the UMH steeple. The *Kennebec Journal* reported that on Friday, December 22, 1916, the wind caused the spire to fall to the lawn below. It was fortunate, the article said that the spire did not fall backward and come down through the roof. The newspaper called the UMH "this famous old landmark."

# A Challenge

The Union Meeting House is excited that the family of Alvin and June Wagner has issued a challenge to another Readfield person or family: "We will match your \$1,000 gift to the Meeting House with an equal gift. Please join us in helping to restore this Readfield landmark."

The Union Meeting House has been called a monument to past generations of Readfield families. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and all gifts to "The Readfield Union Meeting House Co." are fully tax deductible to the donor. Likewise we have to report that Barbara Boenke, who has served on the Board for over five years, has decided that it is time for her to step down. Barbara was always to the point and on target and her involvement will be missed. Our thoughts go with you, Barbara.

The good news is that Donn Harriman, who served as treasurer until he decided to step down last year, has agreed to come back to serve on the Advisory Board. He did much to move the restoration forward so it is a boost to have Donn back as the Board moves forward.
