


Looking for Local Artists



Included in the 356 page book are 220 photos and the histories of forty establishments and their founders that did or still do exist on the lakes Maranacook, Torsey, Lovejoy, Echo and "Lake Myra", including Townsend Farm. Also covered in the book is the coming of the railroad and trolley; the development of Readfield Depot into a village; and the evolvement of this area into a fishing mecca and tourist destination point. If you have not yet ordered a circa sign for your house or business now is the time. We will be placing the next order this month. In addition to the sign you will also receive a copy of the research completed on your house, including what has been discovered about the builder and previous owners. In some cases these signs display a brief history of that structure, such as the one at Readfield Corner that was the "Asa Gile Coffin Shop" before it was moved from Factory Square to its present location and converted to a residence. Profits from the sale of these circa signs will be applied towards the creation and installation of historical site markers in Readfield. Cost is \$75 for each sign, a copy of our research and delivery to your doorstep. Checks should be made payable to Readfield Historical Society. FMI contact Dale at 441-9184 or crossings4u@gmail.com. New Service! Check out the State Park Pass

Looking to spend a little more time outside? Maybe visit some of Maine's beautiful State Parks? Then why not check out the Readfield Community Library's very own State Park Pass!

The Readfield Community Library has recently acquired a vehicle pass, which will allow the pass holder, and the occupants of their vehicle (up to seventeen passengers total) access to the day-use facilities of the Maine State Parks. The park pass can be checked out just like a book. All you need is a library card. The pass can be checked out for up to one week. Once the due date arrives, it must be returned when the library is open. It cannot be left in the book drop. If you are planning a trip, you can reserve the pass in advance. Just check with the librarian so you can be sure of its availability.

Cemetery update

The Town of Readfield and the Cemetery Committee have been working hard, and continue to work harder to preserve the history in our Cemeteries.

On June 17th a Stone Leaning & Cleaning workshop was held at Readfield Corner Cemetery. This was an event made possible through a grant from the Maine Old Cemetery Association in cooperation with the Town of Readfield. Fourteen people attended the workshop with many more stopping by including local folks, many from surrounding towns, and even a few from Sullivan Maine. We were able to clean and straighten about twenty stones in the "Extremely old section". This is the oldest part of the cemetery and is filled with history and beautiful stones. Unfortunately most of the families' decedents are no longer around leaving many of the stones in need of TLC and elbow grease.

If you missed this workshop, and have interest in caring for your loved ones stones, I would love to show or teach anyone with interest. Select Board Letter

Dear Neighbors;

Thank you to everyone who came out to vote on June 13 or earlier by absentee ballot. Citizen participation in the budget process and town meeting article voting validates all the effort put into developing and refining of our budget. Our staff, volunteers serving on boards, committees, and commissions along with the budget committee who reviewed everything deserves a thank you for all the work involved.

No matter how you voted on articles and ordinances, we strove to provide good, accurate information about these items. I do know, we can always improve the process and our communications and we will continue to focus on doing so in the year ahead.

I do want to address one item about which there has been some misunderstanding. In our passed Administrative Ordinance, the procedure for signing spending warrants has changed to allow the Select Board to meet less frequently during the summer and off budget planning months. What has not changed however is crucial. All warrants will still be publically voted upon at Select Board meetings, discussed, and publically recorded. Financial transparency is an important goal for everyone involved in town finances.

In closing, I would like to welcome Dennis Price to the Select Board. I look forward to his perspective and the opportunity to work with him.





Hello Readfield,

My name is Dennis A. Price and I'm your newly elected member of the Select Board. First, I'd like to commend Mr. Dunham on his work and service to his town. I'm about to find out what a commitment that really is. I'm excited to work with the rest of the members of the Board, all of whom supported me during the election. I'm thankful for that and eager to start. Our summer work is scheduled and my first meeting is coming up. I'm ready.

The question most people asked when I told them that I was running for Select Board was generally some version of this — WHAT WOULD YOU DO THAT

FOR? Sometimes it was a more colorful version and other times it was more like mumbling under their breath. I told them that I wanted to be involved in decisions affecting my town and my community. I told them that I was disillusioned from our November election (no matter who you were rooting for) and that process left me feeling disconnected. There are a number of exciting updates to report since the June Messenger article. This news begins with the UMH Board receiving a letter from the Windover Foundation that a grant for \$20,000. has been awarded to us to help with Phase II of the restoration of the sub-floor and related projects. This is a real boost in that it will count towards the \$50,000 matching pledge that a former board member has given.

Another update is that the town warrant article # 27 requesting \$5,000 for the UMH was approved by the Readfield voters. Please see the article by UMH President Marius Peladeau that was submitted to the KJ. At this time it has not been printed so we want to share his letter of thanks with you.

Dear Editor:

The entire Board of the Readfield Union Meeting House wants to thank all the voters in Readfield who voted this past Tuesday to appropriate \$5.000 to aid in the continued restoration of this historic landmark. The recognition by the town elected officials in putting this article on the warrant and then seeing it so well supported by the community shows a recognition that not only is the Meeting House the most beautiful building in town but that, once the restoration is completed, it can again become the most pleasing venue for all types of community events as it was in the past.

The enthusiasm shown by the Readfield 3rd Grade students during their recent visit demonstrates that even at an early age young boys and girls are interested in their local history and that they recognize that the Meeting House's beautiful murals place in a very different category than any other structure in town. To now see – by the recent vote – that others also feel the same way gives the Board the confidence to move forward. Thank you all.


