

Mr. Gordon Hillier was awarded the Boston Post Cane on July 22nd, 2017 by the Readfield Select Board and is currently Readfield's oldest resident. Mr. Hillier was born November 16, 1921 in Augusta, Maine.

Mr. Hillier is a Veteran having served in the 9th Air Force and Air National Guard for 37 years rising to the rank of Chief Master Ser-

geant. He served in France and Germany during and after WWII and was also on active duty during the Korean War. He made a career in the Maine Air National Guard at the Guard Headquarters at Camp Keyes in Augusta.

Mr. Hillier and his wife Barbara of 60 years raised their two sons here in Readfield moving here in 1952. Mrs. Hillier passed in May of 2012.

All containers must be EMPTY, but not perfectly clean.
A light rinse will do.

Know Which Plastics to Recycle

With the exception of polystyrene (Styrofoam), your plastic is recyclable if the answer to all three of these questions is **YES:**

- 1. Does it have a number (1-7) in the middle of the chasing arrow symbol?
- 2. Is it rigid or hard?



3. Is it a container?

Many supermarkets & retail stores accept plastic bags and film for recycling. Find drop-off locations at plasticfilmrecycling.org.

No hazardous waste - ever!

"hazardous waste" must be disposed of carefully
and cannot be included with your trash or
with single-sort recycling:



- Paint thinner
- * Pesticides
- Propane tanks
- Rechargeable batteries
- ¥ TVs

Readfield historian Evelyn Potter and longtime Lake Maranacook summer resident Laurie Emmett will man the RHS building. Enjoy browsing the museum and chatting with Evelyn and Laurie who, in addition to summering in Readfield for decades, was a long time friend of the infamous Townsend sisters - Ruth, Marion, Mary and Alice, of Readfield Depot.



Photo Caption: Townsend Farm on Tallwood Peninsula was established by Linwood and Myrtle Townsend in 1903. Through the next decade their clientele expanded and they decided to increase capacity. In 1913 the couple built a twenty-room, three story home, pictured here. When the Townsends guest rooms became full the owner of nearby Beaver Brook Farm agreed to accept their overload, so that farm also evolved into a tourist home known by various names over the years – lastly as "Rourke's Tourist Home." Townsend Farm was operated by members of the Townsend family until the 1950s.

Day's book "The Founders and Evolution of Summer Resorts and Kids' Camps on Four Lakes in Central Maine". Included in the 356 page book are 220 photos and the histories of forty establishments and their founders that did or still do exist on the lakes Maranacook, Torsey, Lovejoy, Echo and "Lake Myra", including Townsend Farm (see photo). Also covered in the book is the coming of the railroad and trolley; the development of Readfield Depot into a village; and the evolvement of this area into a fishing mecca and tourist destination point. There has been some splendid weather since the rainy and cold days finally gave up and moved on, to enjoy Readfield's trail system. Many residents, both the year round variety as well as seasonal residents plus "people from away" have made good use of this great asset in our town. On any given day, one can see bikers, walkers, baby strollers being pushed, and runners. Several breeds of man's best friend have been noted tagging along with noses to the ground. Alas, no cats on leashes or otherwise have been observed!

This past July marked some changes for the Readfield Trails Committee. Long time members, leaders, supporters, organizers as well as "getting their hands dirty along with aching backs" stalwarts Ann and Gary Keilty decided to officially retire after 11 plus years of leading and directing many changes to the landscape of Readfield with their vision of an accessible and well maintained system of trails. They did this while keeping the cost to the town minimal by recruiting trail committee members as well as other local residents to put in hours of manual labor building the trails. Ann and Gary will be missed certainly, but, true to their nature, they have asked to be called upon to continue to help with the dirty hands and aching back part! Thank you both for your commitment and dedication.

In June, the trails committee sponsored an event at the Readfield Fairgrounds on National Trails Day. A table was available with brochures and maps. Trail users were offered water and snacks to enjoy as they set out walking. Several first time users remarked on the excellent quality of the trails as well as the solitude and comfort the woods provide. Summer Volunteers Needed

30 Mile River

Each summer, volunteer Courtesy Boat Inspectors (CBIs), Invasive Plant Patrollers (IPPs), and water quality monitors play critical roles in protecting our lakes. CBIs inspect boats at launches for invasive plant fragments and serve as friendly educators to the boating community, while IPPs survey lake sections for invasive plants. Water quality monitors test lakes for factors such as clarity, temperature, and oxygen levels, which help indicate the health of a lake. Training is provided for all these positions. Other volunteers provide transport on the lakes for 30MRWA water quality staff. Voluntary Milfoil Stickers Now Available

This season, watershed associations across Maine have teamed up for an easy and tangible way to combat invasive aquatic plants with a voluntary "Milfoil Sticker" for passive watercraft. By voluntarily purchasing a weather-proof, vinyl "Milfoil Sticker" for your canoe, kayak or sailboat, you are helping to spread the word about the importance of controlling these invasive plants and showing your love of the lakes and ponds in our watershed.



These stickers will be sold across the state for a suggested donation of \$5 and proceeds will help fund local boat inspection and plant removal programs. In our watershed, stickers will be available at some of our boat launches (check in with the Courtesy Boat Inspector to see if they have any), lake association meetings, 30MRWA events, our Farmington office, or by contacting Katie at kchurch@30mileriver.org.

Youth Conservation Corps

Though our Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) crew will be wrapping up their season soon, now is the time to submit a site visit request to line up your project for next year! Our YCC provides erosion control landscaping for lakefront property owners. If your property has a sloped driveway, patches of bare soil, or an eroding pathway, then you likely qualify for a **reduced cost** project. Projects may include: shoreline plantings, rain gardens, infiltration dripline trenches, open-top culverts, and more. All projects are designed in partnership between the landowner and experienced technical program staff. 
